## How to use your exclusive gift

## BACK TO BASICS

If you're new to stamping, don't fear as we have everything you need to make the most from your bonus docrafts floral stamps. Simply secure the stamps onto the surface of an acrylic stamping block, ink up the motif and press down. For a precise impression, be sure to apply an even pressure as you stamp and avoid
rocking the block to ensure the ink doesn't smudge. Just be careful not to press down too hard as clear stamps can become distorted resulting in uneven results. Once you're finished, you can easily peel away the stamp from the block and the remaining ink can then be cleaned with mild soap and warm water.

## RETHINK YOUR INK

There are many ways

- to transform your - greetings and stamped - motifs with ink pads, - alcohol markers and brush - pens. Distress inks are a great way to add splashes of vibrancy to your makes and give your cards a rustic look. One of our favourite ways to achieve painterly, blended
backgrounds is by using acetate and a little water. Simply apply the ink onto a sheet of acetate using a paintbrush, spritz with water, then press down onto a panel of watercolour card to transfer the ink. Keep dabbing until you reach the desired effect.

## GIFT TAG

1 Cut white card, 7.5 cm $\times 11 \mathrm{~cm}$, into a tag shape, rounding off each corner. Dab Worn Lipstick distress ink onto acetate and spritz with water, transferring it onto the tag. Dry off with a heat tool.
2
Stamp a sentiment in black ink along with butterfly silhouettes, then colour in. Cut out the images, leaving a white border. Adhere to the tag with 3D foam pads. Punch a hole in the top and finish with ribbon.

## BOTANICAL BORDERS

1 Cut white card to 13 cm square, then stamp leaves around the edges using Hero Arts black ink. Colour the leaves in using alcohol markers. Stamp a doily in the centre, colouring the inner section pink. Attach to a white blank, 13 cm square, with double-sided tape. $2 \begin{aligned} & \text { Print a rose onto white } \\ & \text { card, colour in and trim, }\end{aligned}$ leaving a narrow border all

## TOP TIP

## When colouring

 larger areas with alcohol markers, ensure the paper is saturated with ink so that you can't see any lines1 Take a 13 cm square white blank and die cut a circle from the front. Trim a 13 cm square panel of watercolour card and cut the same large circle from the centre. Spritz with water and 2 add Picked Raspberry distress ink with a wet paintbrush to create the effect shown. Dry off with a heat tool. Adhere the panel to the card front with double-sided tape. 3 Using the circle that 3 was cut from the centre of the card front, blend Spun Sugar distress ink over the shape, then adhere onto the inside of the card with double-sided tape, ensuring to position it within the aperture.
4 Stamp a large rose 4 onto white card, colour in and cut out, leaving a narrow border. Add the flower to the bottom-right edge of the circle with 3D foam pads.
5 Die cut a smaller circle from white and stamp a rose and sentiment onto the centre. Colour the rose in, before layering the disc to the centre of the large pink circle with 3D foam pads.

1 Create a white blank, $11 \mathrm{~cm} \times 14 \mathrm{~cm}$. Cut another panel of white card, $10.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 14 \mathrm{~cm}$. Dip a wide paintbrush into Spectrum Noir Aquatints, then lightly brush across the panel. Dry with a heat tool.
2 Stamp a heart in black $\mathcal{L}$ ink, then add details with a white gel pen. Print a banner and sentiment onto white cardstock and trim, leaving a narrow white border around the banner.
3 Press a lace border down J the sides repeatedly to create two borders from top to bottom. Attach the panel onto the card front with double-sided tape. Add the sentiment beneath the heart with 3D foam pads.



Matt pink paper onto a white blank, $7.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 11 \mathrm{~cm}$. Spritz Picked Raspberry distress ink onto acetate and transfer onto watercolour card. Stamp borders down each side in black, along with a sentiment and heart. Adhere the panel onto the card front with double-sided tape.



## DOILY TOPPERS

1 Cut a panel of watercolour card slightly smaller. Apply Spiced Marmalade distress ink onto a sheet of acetate and spritz with water.
2 Place the acetate 2 onto the watercolour panel until the desired
effect is achieved. Dry off with a heat tool and adhere to a white blank, 10 cm square. Stamp a doily onto white and cut out, leaving a narrow border all around.
3 Stamp leaves to the centre of the doily and colour in. Secure the doily onto the centre of the greeting with 3D foam pads. Print a flower onto white and colour in.

4 Cut the flower out, once again leaving a narrow border. Add detail to the centre of the flower with a white gel pen and adhere to the centre of the doily with 3D foam pads.
5 Print a sentiment onto a strip of white card in black ink and cut the right end into a diagonal. Adhere the sentiment to the card front with 3D foam pads to finish.

## DISTRESSED EFFEGTS

1 Take white card, 15 cm | square, and stamp eight butterflies in a circle. Colour them in with marker pens. Blend Spiced Marmalade distress ink around the edges, then spritz with water, dabbing the excess with a paper towel and drying off with a heat tool. Adhere to the front of a white blank, 15 cm square.
Die cut a circle from 2 white, blend Spiced Marmalade distress ink all over and spritz with water, dabbing off the excess. Stamp a butterfly in the centre and colour in. Add a sentiment beneath the butterfly using black ink. Fix the disc to the centre of the card with 3D foam pads.


## BACKGROUNDS

1 Mount pink paper onto a 15cm square blank using double-sided tape. Stamp hearts in Rose Bud and Angel Pink Memento inks onto a panel of white card. Blend Spun Sugar $\mathcal{L}$ distress ink around the edges of the panel, before adhering it to the centre of the greeting. Stamp a rose onto white in black ink and colour in. Cut out, ensuring to leave a border.
3 Trim a narrow strip of white card, then stamp a sentiment on the right-hand end and adhere to the card front. Adhere the rose to the opposite end to finish.




Mental health is something many of us are increasingly aware of and I hope my papercut will provide a welcome sentiment of encouragement to those struggling with mental health issues. I drew it on my iPad, then printed it and used a scalpel to hand cut the design. It's backed with a digitally designed paper to make it striking.

I love making spooky crafts! Here, I stamped silver cobwebs onto black card, then created a moon and blended purple, grey and black distress ink on to a slightly smaller panel of white. Little bats were then stamped all over. For the branch, I hand drew, coloured and cut it out, then hung die-cut coloured Tattered Lace skulls from it.

An invite to a friend's wedding inspired me to make a red and gold card and matching gift card wallet. I was thrilled to discover this was their colour theme. I layered embossed card and gold mirri onto a white blank, then decorated it with pearls, ribbon, hand-cut hearts and a gem. The design was mirrored onto the gift card holder. They absolutely loved it!

## CLAIRE DAY, COVENTRY



This gorgeous hand-drawn and hand-cut floral animal design is part of a series of 12 papercutting templates. They have a slightly different take on woodland animals but are still recognisable. My paper creations are mainly in black and white, but I love creating colourful pieces too. I have always been inspired by nature and taking leisurely strolls through the woods.

## CELEBRATE

1 Create an $11 \mathrm{~cm} \times 12 \mathrm{~cm}$ top-folding blank from pink card and cover the front with cocktail paper. Trim balloon paper to 9.5 cm $\times 10.5 \mathrm{~cm}$ and layer on top.
Attach a strip of ice L cream paper, 3 cm $\times 12 \mathrm{~cm}$, along the bottom of the card and wrap twine around the greeting twice. Fix a paper flower to the centre.
3 Layer up a decoupage with 3D foam pads and secure to the top of the card as shown. Add a button in each corner, then finish with a puffy sentiment sticker in the top-left corner.

## GEOMETRIC TWIST

1 Make a $13.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 15.5 \mathrm{~cm}$ top-folding blank from pink, then use the template provided to trim the card into a hexagonal shape.
Cut out another 2 hexagon from balloon paper using the template and cut 1 cm off each side. Layer onto a hexagonal panel of sentiment paper, before attaching to the card front.

Z Adhere a doily to the left. Die cut a hexagon from pink spotty paper, matt onto yellow card, then attach to the bottom-left corner. Fix a hexagon puffy sticker on top.
24 Layer up a hexagonal f decoupage with 3D foam pads and glue to the right-hand side. Add a star puffy sticker and a paper flower to the left, then finish with buttons.


## MAKE A WISH

1 Cut pink card into a $13.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 14 \mathrm{~cm}$ top-folding blank. Score and fold the front panel across the centre to create an easel card. Trim two pieces of pink 2 spotty paper, 6.5 cm $\times 13.5 \mathrm{~cm}$, then attach to the front and back. Cut another piece, $6 \mathrm{~cm} \times 13.5 \mathrm{~cm}$, and secure to the base.
3 Adhere present paper, $5.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 12.5 \mathrm{~cm}$, to the card front, layer up a cake decoupage with 3D foam pads and secure on top. Fix a puffy sticker in the top-right corner.
$4 \begin{aligned} & \text { Trim present paper } \\ & \text { to } 5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 12.5 \mathrm{~cm} \text { and }\end{aligned}$ attach to the base along with a $2 \mathrm{~cm} \times 14 \mathrm{~cm}$ strip of pink patterned paper. Add buttons and paper flowers to finish.


## WITH LOVE

1 Take an 11cm x 16cm top-folding pink blank and cover the front with pink spotty paper. Cut cake paper to $10 \mathrm{~cm} \times 14 \mathrm{~cm}$ and matt on top.
Attach a doily to the $\mathcal{L}$ top-right corner, trimmed to fit. Fix yellow striped paper behind a wooden frame, then glue on top of the doily. Add a puffy sticker sentiment inside the frame.
3 Wrap twine across the 3 top of the greeting and tie into a bow, then add a paper flower to the centre. Attach bunting across the twine and finish with buttons in the two bottom corners.


1 Make a $13 \mathrm{~cm} \times 18 \mathrm{~cm}$ top-folding blank from pink card. Trim watercolour effect paper to 11.5 cm $\times 16.5 \mathrm{~cm}$, layer onto yellow striped paper, then attach to the card front.
Trim pink spotty paper 2 to $7 \mathrm{~cm} \times 11 \mathrm{~cm}$ and cut diagonally from the right-hand side to 3 cm up from the bottom-left corner. Fix to the bottom of the watercolour effect paper and wrap twine around the middle.

Z Adhere a doily in the top-right corner and layer up a present decoupage with 3D foam pads. Attach to the left-hand side and secure a sentiment puffy sticker in the top-right corner. 2 Glue mini bunting across the twine and add a twine bow. Attach a sentiment in the bottom-right corner with 3D foam pads and add three buttons underneath to finish.

## HAPPY DAYS

1 Take a $12 \mathrm{~cm} \times 15 \mathrm{~cm}$ teal blank and cut the front down to 6 cm . Layer party hat paper, $11 \mathrm{~cm} \times 14 \mathrm{~cm}$, onto yellow striped paper, then attach to the inside of the card.
Secure yellow striped 2 paper, $5.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 14.5 \mathrm{~cm}$, to the card front. Cut a strip of party hat paper, $1.5 \mathrm{~cm} x$ 15 cm , and adhere down the left-hand side. Wrap twine down the side of the greeting twice.
Z Tuck bunting beneath the twine in the top-left corner and glue into place. Add a button to the central bunting flag, then secure three buttons to the bottom-right corner. 14 Attach watercolour 4 effect paper behind two wooden frames and fix to the card front. Add puffy stickers to each frame and finish with paper flowers.

## Sayer it cyp!

To make your greetings pop, use the Make A Wish decoupage pad to build card toppers with ultimate impact. The set includes three sheets of eight glittery party themed designs, each one die cut for easy and quick assembly. Simply pop the motifs out and layer up the coordinating images on top of one another with 3D foam pads for eye-catching embellishments.

## LETS PARTY

1 Use the template provided to score and fold a stepper blank from yellow card. Mount cocktail paper, $7.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 9 \mathrm{~cm}$, onto pink patterned paper and adhere to the front.
Mount a $2 \mathrm{~cm} \times 15.5 \mathrm{~cm}$ $\mathcal{L}$ strip of cocktail paper onto pink patterned paper, then secure around the bottom. Layer up a circular decoupage with 3D foam pads and attach to the front.
3 Wrap twine across the 3 bottom of the card twice and fix three bunting flags below the decoupage. Add a button to each flag, then fix a twine bow to the centre. $\downarrow$ Trim two pieces of watercolour effect paper to $2.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 7.5 \mathrm{~cm}$, layer onto pink patterned paper and secure to each side panel. Attach two mini envelopes, puffy stickers and buttons to complete.





## JUST FOR YOU

1 Cover a $13 \mathrm{~cm} \times 15 \mathrm{~cm}$ top-folding yellow blank with present paper. Trim pink spotty paper to 10.5 cm $x 12.5 \mathrm{~cm}$, then adhere on top. Add a doily to the right-hand corner of the
pink spotty paper, trimming off the excess.
Cut sentiment paper to $2.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 15 \mathrm{~cm}$ and position on top of the layers as shown. Create a cake decoupage with 3D foam pads and attach to the right-hand side. Tuck a mini envelope behind the
bottom-left corner and add puffy stickers.
Z Adhere a short length $\int$ of twine to the top-left corner, then fix bunting on top. Add buttons to the bunting flags and finish with a paper flower on top of the envelope.

## Rainbow stripes

Master three techniques in one tutorial with PaperCrafter designer Claire Richards

## WATERCOLOUR BLEND

Paint stripes in various colours across a panel of watercolour card, 11 cm $x 15 \mathrm{~cm}$. Once dry, die cut with a scalloped frame, then adhere to a white blank, $11 \mathrm{~cm} \times 15 \mathrm{~cm}$.
Adhere a white doily to $\mathcal{L}$ the left of the card, then
trim the excess. Die cut a stitched rectangle from vellum and attach to the card front with a small amount of glue in each corner. Cover the glue marks with enamel dots. 3 Stamp an owl, branch and flowers onto watercolour card using a clear embossing ink pad. Sprinkle over gold embossing powder, then heat set. Colour the motifs in with watercolour paints and trim with the coordinating dies 4 Die cut 'Good luck' from 4 white card. Secure the letters onto the card front, replacing the first ' $O$ ' with the owl motif. Fix the branch between the sentiment and adhere the two birds.


## STAMPED SENTIMENTS

1 Cut white card to 10 cm x 14 cm . Using a stamp platform, press 'Good luck' in purple ink along the top line. The second ' $O$ ' will need to be stamped separately later on.
Offset the card in the $\mathcal{L}$ stamp press, then use green ink to stamp the sentiment again. Repeat this step in different colour inks. Add in the missing 'O's where required, then apply alphabet shadows in black ink. Z Mask off sections of an $11 \mathrm{~cm} \times 15 \mathrm{~cm}$ white blank and use distress inks to create stripes, matching the colour order of the sentiments. Fix the stamped panel centrally onto the greeting. Add enamel dots to complete.

## INKED STRIPES

1 Trim white card to 11 cm $\times 15 \mathrm{~cm}$. Following the step-by-step, apply distress inks in Candied Apple, Mustard Seed, Twisted Citron, Peacock Feathers and Dusty Concord across the card to create a stripy background. Once the card is dry, fix to a white 11 cm $\times 15 \mathrm{~cm}$ blank.
Stamp a wreath, 2 colour and cut with the coordinating dies. Stamp ‘Good luck onto a circle of white and colour in. Adhere a white doily to the greeting, trim off the excess, then secure the sentiment and wreath. Embellish with enamel dots to finish.




Mask off the top section and apply the first colour of distress ink


Leaving a thin white border inbetween, mask off a 2 cm section below. Apply the next colour of distress ink, then repeat downwards


Spritz with water and Perfect Pearls pigment powders, then leave to dry


Finish off the panel with die-cuts, a sentiment and embellishments

Earn your

There are many ways to pack your cards with vibrancy and create statement backgrounds, so I've rounded up my top ways to achieve exactly this with striking gradient stripes. From stamping to inking and painting, use every skill up your crafty sleeve to make a coordinating collection of greetings. I love the huge variety of mixed media products available on the market right now and it's incredibly fun to play around with them to see what creative effects you can make.

## Mixed media tricks

Each method I have used is incredibly simple to master, but there are a few steps you can take to fine-tune your technique. For repeat stamping, I would thoroughly recommend a stamping platform to ensure precision. The clear stamp will cling to the lid and stay in the same position for multiple applications. When using paints to create ombré stripes, prevent the colours from bleeding into each other by limiting the amount of water you apply. What's more, if you plan to colour in your motifs with watercolours, heat emboss them beforehand to stop the paints from mixing.

## SUNSET OMBRE

Mask off a circle and apply blue and purple ink to create a midnight mood effect. Colour up the Raven stamp with grey ink and print onto the panel. Use the Tree Branch and Mini Berry stamp to add more detail around the edges.

iddle-leaf figs, Pileas, Swallowtails and pink polka dots - many of us like to decorate our windowsills and coffee tables with natural greenery, but us crafters know that you can make such delights from paper. When they can look just as beautiful as the real thing, standing proudly in their pots, why wouldn't you? Plus, they don't require watering - bonus! This is exactly what self-confessed paper plant addict Corrie Beth Hogg does for a living as art and craft director for David Stark Design, and now she's



## LIFELONG ARTIST

Corrie Beth Hogg found her creative calling at a young age and has been producing art in a variety of mediums for as long as she can remember. "My grandmother taught me how to sew when I was just eight," explains the 40 year-old. Using her newly found stitching skills, she then began to delight her neighbours by selling handmade rag dolls to them in her Mississippi hometown.

While her favourite mediums now include collage, paper mache and papercrafting, her passion for paper wasn't instantaneous. "I enjoyed drawing mostly," Corrie adds. "I would fill page after page of notebooks with portraits and landscapes."

Her family were her biggest influence growing up with a "Jill of all trades" grandmother and aunts who she claims are masters of quilting. "My grandmother could sew anything and sing anything, plus she made gorgeous drawings and watercolour paintings," she says. "There

are quite a few designers, artists and makers in my family. They have very different styles, so it's fun to see what they make." Perhaps Corrie has her talented relatives to thank for her creative flair.
Dabbling in crochet, calligraphy and sculpture too, she would even craft dreamcatchers from vines she'd found during her adventures outdoors. Her love of nature has also been ingrained within her since she was small as she spent many happy afternoons exploring the woods, climbing trees and canoeing in the bayous. "I grew up near a national park which was like an extension of our backyard," recalls Corrie. Sounds like the perfect childhood, doesn't it?

## INTRINSICALLY INTERTWINED

It was this love for nature which introduced Corrie to her second love - paper. Still eager to transport the outdoors inside as an adult, she wanted to fill her Brooklyn-based apartment with
houseplants. It's ironic then that someone so keen to decorate their home with foliage owns a windowless living room. Despite the lack of natural light in her apartment, she didn't let this stop her. "I desperately wanted a fiddle leaf fig, so I made one from paper!" Corrie exclaims. After that, she continued crafting paper plants, which led her to achieve her proudest moment yet - releasing her book. Combining Corrie's two passions, Handmade Houseplants provides the paper folding techniques and tools to create 30 different no-water alternatives. Many of the projects can be rustled up in a matter of hours and transformed into eye-catching wall art as well as gifts for loved ones.

## A BLOSSOMING FUTURE

Currently, when she's not busy hand making houseplants in her cosy light-filled workspace, Corrie can be found in Brooklyn Botanic Garden taking photos of

real ones. "I only live a few blocks away, so I am there nearly every weekend," she says. But it doesn't stop there - Corrie also collects eye-catching images of plants on Pinterest to inspire her paper creations.
She finds the versatility of the material the most enjoyable aspect. "I truly believe anything can be made with paper," she claims. "It's also inexpensive, unpretentious and readily available. It's an ideal medium!" Her paper Pilea is her favourite design. "I can make them in various shapes and sizes just like the real thing," she explains.
While she adores working with it, Corrie doesn't necessarily find the process of manipulating paper easy. Her day job often involves producing large-scale paper creations, and covering a series of entire walls with tropical paper leaves has been her most challenging creation to date. "I spent a lot of time on a ladder that week!" she laughs.

Not embarrassed to admit a household appliance is her secret weapon, she uses an iron to smooth any creases in her artwork. "Often, I will add a subtle wash with paints to a plant to get my desired shade," she says. "Because I am working with thin papers, they curl or get wrinkly. The iron easily flattens the paper."
As Corrie reveals there are more paper plants in the pipeline, she shares some invaluable knowledge with us all. "Don't be afraid to ask for advice. Most artists are happy to share their knowledge and experience," she explains. "Also, remember to enjoy the process as much as the end result."

So, next time you're popping to your local garden centre, think again - you might already have everything you need at home to create something that'll last beyond a lifetime.

## FOLD-AWAY CARD

1 Cut the main circular base from green cardstock and score the shape from the centre to the outer notches. Crease along the folds and assemble, fastening the join with a paperclip temporarily for ease of decorating.

2From pink watercolour effect paper, cut quarter circle shapes and glue them to the relevant panels to imitate a sky. Cut another quarter circle from green paper and fold or snip it in half before glueing it to the base of the card so it can still fold in.
3 Cut half a mountain range from green marbled paper and a second flipped image to complete the scenery. Fix these to the back of the scene with 3D foam pads. Add the corresponding snow caps, cut from paler

paper. Secure a smaller grassy hillock to the foreground, folding it in half before fixing it with 3D foam pads.
$L$ Using foiled and floral paper, cut two teepees. Crease them in half and curl the openings around a
pencil so they stand on the base of the card. Hand-cut a floral topper from paper and fix it to the right-hand front edge. Trim and matt a sentiment, before adhering to the left. Glue the assembly tab permanently once complete.


3 Test cut
Check your blade is sharp and free from paper fibres and perform a test cut on the same weight cardstock before you start your project.

4 You're ready to start Remember to secure your card to the sticky mat properly before starting as intricate cutting patterns will cause the blade to change direction suddenly and this may cause the card to shift if the mat has lost its tack.

Die cut a small butterfly $\mathcal{L}$ twice in white, yellow and pink patterned paper. Fold each one in half, then glue the three colours together. Die cut a butterfly from patterned paper and fix to the front of the bag, along with the stacked butterflies.
Z Wrap yellow and white ribbon around the base, then attach a bag filled with sweets in the centre. Tie yellow baker's twine to secure the bag together.

As one year ends and another begins, it's the perfect opportunity to try new techniques and use up those old paper scraps you've been hoarding. From die cutting and paper piecing to stamping, you can do just that with Tonic Studios' beautiful dies! You could even position a butterfly onto a white background and colour it in. 1 Mount green star paper onto a white top-folding blank, $14 \mathrm{~cm} \times 15.5 \mathrm{~cm}$, leaving a border at the top and bottom. Glue a strip of pink spotty paper across the bottom.
2 Die cut a Mariposa
2 butterfly from
white card, trace around the edge of it and cut it out, then layer together. Die cut the same butterfly from a variety of patterned papers, then arrange the pieces onto the die-cut base in a pretty pattern.
$Z$ score down the middle 5 of the design and die cut a butterfly centre from patterned paper and card. Secure together. Apply 3D foam pads near the centre of the butterfly and fix onto the card base. Stamp and trim out a sentiment, then add to the butterfly.

1 Cover a $10 \mathrm{~cm} \times 14 \mathrm{~cm}$ notebook in turquoise patterned paper. Die cut a medium butterfly from white card and fix onto the book front. Fold the excess around the back and secure. Die cut a medium L butterfly from various patterned papers and arrange into the spaces. To finish, add the excess hearts from the butterfly centre die-cut beneath the butterfly.

Die cut a star frame from red, stick to the front of the shaker, then attach the panel towards the top of the tag.

$9.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 13.5 \mathrm{~cm}$, layer onto yellow card, then adhere to the front.
Cut star paper,
L $2.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 14.5 \mathrm{~cm}$,
matt onto yellow, and fix across the front. Attach a strip of white star paper across it, then stick our 'Good luck' sentiment on top with 3D foam pads.
Z Die cut three 3.5 cm diameter circles from white star paper, layer onto yellow, then attach to the tops of the acetate strips.

foam pads. Complete with star gems.

## SEQUIN APERTURE

1 Make a 15cm square top-folding white blank. Trim cat paper, 14cm square, layer onto red card, then fix to the front. Cut our white star paper, $8.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 11 \mathrm{~cm}$, and matt onto red.
Die cut a 6 cm 2 diameter circle through the panel towards the top, then adhere acetate behind the aperture. Run foam tape around the back of the
aperture and sprinkle sequins onto the acetate.
Z Remove the backing from the foam tape, then attach orange star paper face-down on top. Secure the shaker on the left-hand side of the greeting using 3D foam pads, then wrap red ribbon around the card front.
4 Layer a sentiment onto red and adhere in the bottom-right corner with 3D foam pads. Fix three cats onto the card. Die cut a star topper into a circle, then attach on the right. Add a bow to the left of the ribbon and finish with star gems.


SWEET SLIDER
1 Trim our dog paper, $12 \mathrm{~cm} \times 17 \mathrm{~cm}$, matt onto blue card, then attach to a $13 \mathrm{~cm} \times 18 \mathrm{~cm}$ top-folding white blank. Adhere a star tab in the top-right corner. 2 Cut orange star paper, $27.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 18 \mathrm{~cm}$, layer onto blue and snip a slot along the bottom. Wrap red ribbon around the top, then fix to the card with 3D foam pads. Adhere the
cut-out strip of star paper back into the slot.
Z Place two pennies in the slot and attach 3D foam pads on top. Cut out two dogs, adhere a penny to the back of each of them, before fixing them on top of the pennies in the slot.
4 Layer a circular sentiment onto blue card and stick towards the top of the card. Add a bow to the left-hand side of the sentiment, then finish with star gems.








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# HASTE makes WA <br> Stop what you're doing! Before you throw those paper offcuts away, is there a craftier, more eco-friendly solution?

סavid Attenborough, Stacey Dooley, Liz Bonnin... what do these presenters have in common?
They've all had us horrified, staring at the TV with a look of pure astonishment as toxic waste is poured into our oceans and albatross parents unwittingly feed their chicks plastic. Saving our environment has never been more important and the global conversation feels as if it's only just begun.
As crafters, there are so many things we can do with our surplus supplies before buying new materials. For starters, never bin negative die-cuts. You'll always find a use for them in future card designs. If you've got slices of paper too small to function, grab a punch to create unique confetti - it's perfect for shaker cards, which are a firm favourite at

PaperCrafter HQ. You could also snip scraps into quelling strips! Use old food containers to store these odds and sods so you can find what you're looking for easily.

A big frustration for eco-minded folk is not knowing which plastics are recyclable. If you're unsure, why not use a sheet of plastic to mix paints or other mixed media products? Also consider different textures

- use bubble
wrap to create circle patterns or
scrunch up polythene plastic to apply ink to backgrounds in a random way. Everything serves a purpose!

Make a pencil mark 2 cm in from the top edge on each side. Next, line up a ruler from the mark to the bottom corner and trim to create two roof shapes


Attach $2 \mathrm{~cm} \times 3 \mathrm{~cm}$ of white card to the right of the scalloped roof. Secure on the reverse, then add a small rectangle of pink, $1 \mathrm{~cm} \times 3 \mathrm{~cm}$, to the top. Back with the remaining roof panel


Assemble windows using the strips, trimming away any excess. Fix a bunny motif behind each one


Trim four strips of pink card, $2 \mathrm{~cm} \times 15.5 \mathrm{~cm}$, and scallop cut along one edge


Adhere the roof to the top of the greeting. To complete, cut out and stick a sentiment to the centre of the roof

1 Score and cut along a white blank, $9 \mathrm{~cm} \times 18 \mathrm{~cm}$, 6 cm in from one long edge to make an offset card. Cover the outside of the blank with wood effect paper and the inside with text printed pale pink. Add a text printed pink strip down the left-hand side, $2.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 5.5 \mathrm{~cm}$.
Stamp a 'You are 2 beautiful' sentiment onto pink heart paper, 2.5 cm $\times 5.5 \mathrm{~cm}$, and glue onto textured green. Attach onto the top-right of the greeting. Die cut a hydrangea and foliage from textured green card. Glue to the lower-front of the card.
3 Die cut hydrangeas and some foliage from two different shades of pink card, then layer over the corresponding flowers underneath with 3D foam pads. Allow the foliage to extend over the edge of the blank.

Our cardmaker Kitty Frampton has made her the centre of attention on all seven of these cards, and it's hard not to be enamoured with each and every one.

## DOWNLOAD AND PRINT THEM

1 On your desktop computer, visit papercraftermagazine.co.uk and search 'Little Pippa digi stamps'.Press 'Click here to download now' then log in - or register if you don't currently have an account with us.
3 Click 'Download now' and you'll see the download processing at the bottom of your screen.
$L$ Open the folder, then right-click on the file and select 'Print'.

## PENS AT THE READY

Kitty has used Copic markers
(copic-shop.co.uk) to achieve such lovely graduations of colour on Little Pippa. She recommends using three tones of the same colour: a light, medium and darker shade. Work from dark to light this uses up less ink - and ensure you go over the join line slightly to create that desired ombré effect. You can also go back over the darkest hue a little if it's too light and you want more depth.

## GO THE EXTRA MILE

Think about ways to further enhance these endearing designs. For example, on our top-right card, Kitty has applied a touch of glitter to the daisy centre, which ties in well with the yellow pearls. She's also added rosy cheeks to each character, bringing Little Pippa to life even more, as well as opting for different hair colours for extra variation.

## DON'T FORGET THE BACKGROUNDS

Make these designs pop by matting and layering various patterned papers behind them. You can keep the digi stamp panels rectangular, die cut them into circles or simply cut them out by hand, leaving a narrow border - Kitty demonstrates all of these options opposite. We also love the die-cut background with its criss-cross pattern.

## 'Dinamic' slider gards

Step back in time with Colette Smith to create slider cards sure to cause a roar




## WISH BIG

1 Stick $9.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 12.5 \mathrm{~cm}$ of pale blue card to the top of a 13 cm square top-folding white blank. Add a 3 cm $\times 9.5 \mathrm{~cm}$ strip of pale green 1 cm up from the bottom edge of the pale blue.
Wavy cut one edge of 2 pale green card, 6.5 cm $\times 9.5 \mathrm{~cm}$, then follow the step-by-step to sandwich two coins together and cut a slot 2 cm up from the bottom edge. Attach the panel to the blank with 3D foam tape, in line with the pale green.

Z Stamp, colour and die cut three trees, a stegosaurus and a baby dinosaur. Position and glue the trees, using 3D foam pads behind the leaves. To finish, fix the stegosaurus to the slider and the baby dinosaur to the bottom-right along with a stamped sentiment.

## RAWR!

1 Cover a 13.5 cm square top-folding white blank with a 13 cm square of pale grey card. Wavy trim one edge of pale green, 8.5 cm $\times 13 \mathrm{~cm}$, and adhere to the bottom of the grey. Add a $3.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 13 \mathrm{~cm}$ panel of dark green to the bottom. Trim a wavy line across 2 the top of dark green card, $5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 13 \mathrm{~cm}$. Cut a 1 cm $\times 6.5 \mathrm{~cm}$ slot half way down, 1.5 cm in from the left, then follow the step-by-step to create the slider element. Using foam tape, attach the panel to the bottom of the blank.


3Stamp, colour and die cut three palm trees,
two T-Rex dinosaurs, two small clouds, and flowers and leaves. Stick the trees to the blank with the trunks behind the slider panel. Fix one T-Rex to the right of the slider and attach the other onto the slider. Adhere all elements, then finish with a sentiment and gem.

## DINO-MITE

1 Cut a $1 \mathrm{~cm} \times 8 \mathrm{~cm}$ slot
4.5 cm down from the top edge of pale blue card, $10 \mathrm{~cm} \times 14 \mathrm{~cm}$. Next, follow the step-by-step to create a slider element. Stamp, colour and die cut five palm trees, one Pterodactyl and two small clouds. Glue the trees along the bottom of the panel, removing any excess.
Stamp a sentiment in 2 the top corner and add the clouds. Layer 9.5 cm $\times 13.5 \mathrm{~cm}$ of pale blue card onto a $10.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 14.5 \mathrm{~cm}$ top-folding white blank. Attach the Pterodactyl to the slider and the slider panel onto the blank with foam tape. Add a gem onto one of the clouds to complete.

Cut a $1 \mathrm{~cm} \times 8 \mathrm{~cm}$ slot in coloured card, 4.5 cm down from the top edge

Cover a 5 p coin with card and trim. Stick foam tape, slightly narrower than 1 cm , onto the reverse of the covered coin


Attach a dinosaur to the coin and add the slider panel to a top-folding white blank with foam tape


## COLETTE'S

TOP TIPS


Slider cards are easy to make, but they add a fun twist to an ordinary card.
All you need are some small coins and foam tape to create the slider element. This then fits into a slot in the card so it can move from side to side. Once you have mastered the basic slider, you can apply this technique to most stamps and die-cuts in your stash. Just think about bringing a scene to life - here you'll find dinosaurs exploring in their natural habitat, but vehicles, hatching eggs and Christmas crackers are great options for kinetic cards too.

One pence pieces are usually used for slider cards but because these images are small, I used five pence pieces. Adding a coloured panel behind the slider element helps to blend it into the background of the card. I've kept the background and colouring bold and simple for a cute cartoon effect to make wonderful greetings for dino lovers of all ages.

0PINE AND DANDY MAKER: SARA NAUMANN
Apply a few drops of green distress ink onto white card followed by drops of pink. Brayer and blend the inks together, then spatter diluted pink ink onto the background. Mount onto white, then green card and wrap with pink twine. Form a white blank, 13 cm $x 17 \mathrm{~cm}$, and glue the background to the centre. Stamp and emboss a sentiment onto vellum, matt onto white card and trim at an angle. Use foam tape to adhere to the front. Stamp and emboss a cactus, then colour in. Cut out and attach to the card front using foam tape. Add a bow and gem to finish.

## (2) <br> DAISY SLIDER <br> MAKER: TRACEY DAYKIN-JONES

Layer pink onto blue card, 10.5 cm $\times 15 \mathrm{~cm}$. Die cut two small circles just above the centre, 2.5 cm in from either side. Trim a horizontal strip between the holes. Die cut two flowers from white, adhere together with a 3D foam pad and fix a penny to the back with double-sided tape. Adhere a 3D foam pad to the other side of the coin, then fit through the slot. Secure a second penny to the reverse. Cover another
piece of blue card, $10.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 15 \mathrm{~cm}$, with floral paper. Fold a horizontal line, 2.5 cm down from the top, then join the front and back using double-sided tape. Die cut 'Happy' from green and attach.

(3)INSPIRE ME
MAKER: SARA NAUMANN
Scribble a red marker pen onto a craft sheet and spritz with water. Roll a brayer through the colour, then across white card. Repeat with pink, leave to dry, then apply yellow. Trim to 10.5 cm wide and mount onto pink card, then fix to a blank, $12.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 17.5 \mathrm{~cm}$. Stamp 'You inspire me' onto white, trim and run a pink marker along the edges, then attach to the card. Stamp flowers onto white and colour them in. Scribble red onto the craft sheet and add water. Blend the edges of colour onto the flowers and add yellow to each one. Cut out, then adhere with 3D foam pads. Finish with a bow and gems.

## 4 <br> SAY HELLO <br> MAKER: KEREN BAKER

Tape hexagon dies onto yellow card, run it through your die-cutting machine, then fix to a white blank, $11.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 16 \mathrm{~cm}$. Die cut hexagons from

various patterned papers, then secure them into their corresponding apertures. Create three white hexagons in different sizes. Make two 'Hello' sentiments from white and pink. Offset the white behind the pink, then stick together before mounting onto the largest hexagon. Add an orange strip of paper below the wording, then mount to the card using 3D foam pads. Fix the other white hexagons below the largest, secure an orange strip, then glue another to a background shape.

## (5) <br> COLOUR MY WORLD

MAKER: COLETTE SMITH
Draw around the inside of a small circle die onto white card, $10.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 15 \mathrm{~cm}$.
Draw lines coming out from the circle in each direction and cut out alternate
sections. Using the cut card as a template, draw around the shape onto another piece of white card. Colour in the sections that can be seen between the white rays. Layer the white front onto the coloured card and trim. Matt the panel onto a $10.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 15 \mathrm{~cm}$ blank with 3D foam tape. Stamp a sentiment, cut out with a small circle die and matt onto black. Stick to the centre of the white panel and add gems to finish.

## 6 <br> CELEBRATE TODAY

## MAKER: COLETTE SMITH

Create a circular white blank using a 10.5 cm circle die. Stick a layer of floral paper to the front and leave a narrow border. Die cut a 7.5 cm circle from white card and adhere it to the centre with 3D foam pads. Punch four small feathers from patterned paper, then
arrange them at the top and bottom of the white circle. Fix a sentiment sticker in the centre.

## (7) BEST DAY EVER MAKER: KIM DELLOW

Cover a blank, $11.5 \mathrm{~cm} \times 14 \mathrm{~cm}$, with dotty paper. Stamp a half doily motif onto aqua paper in green ink and again on a spare piece. Cut out the image from the spare paper and place it over the other. Press the doily again, slightly overlapping the first image. Trim the green doilies and adhere to the card front. Add a sentiment strip along the bottom and a bicycle topper above. Stick baker's twine across the top-left corner of the card front and add two pennants. Cut another with a small heart in the centre from coloured paper and attach to the card front to finish.

## STEP ONE

Score and fold blue card, $12 \mathrm{~cm} \times 22 \mathrm{~cm}$, into a blank and trim into an 11.5 cm wide circle shape, keeping the fold intact. Cover with dark blue patterned paper, then add a 10 cm circle of light blue patterned paper to the centre.

## STEP TWO

Using our template as a guide, lightly sketch 'Happy New Year' in pencil. Next, trace over it with a chisel tipped marker pen, allowing the ink to dry before erasing the pencil lines.

## STEP THREE

Die cut small stars firstly from an assortment of blue paper scraps, then from self-adhesive copper foil. Layer the stars together and fix to the front of the card

Using the flower $\mathcal{L}$ template provided, create another template from old newspaper. Lay the 3D card flat, fold the flower template lengthways down the middle and place in the centre. Trace around it. Trim the flower and open it out into a 3D structure. Add painted details to the card. Z Once everything is dry, trim the base of the 3D flower to ensure a sturdy fit and place inside the pot. To finish, pour sand into the pot to hide the base.

1 Layer $12 \mathrm{~cm} \times 17 \mathrm{~cm}$ of shiny green card onto a white blank, 12.5 cm x 17.5 cm , and cut two smaller pieces of white. Follow the step-by-step to emboss the white cardstock with an embossing folder, then turn one over to reveal the debossed side. Adhere to the base.
Die cut a cross-stitched $\mathcal{L}$ circular frame from yellow card. Fix to the base with 3D foam pads. Individually cut out the leaves from the remaining embossed

## When

 embossing, use textured card to add further dimension
## HIP HIP HOORAY!

1 Die cut a square frame from the centre of yellow card, 12.5 cm square. Create a thin light green frame the same size as the yellow aperture. Die cut a sentiment from white card, then pink, and layer together, slightly offset.
Apply green ink to the 2 flat side of an embossing folder, add white cardstock and run it through a diecutting machine. Remove from the folder, allow it to dry, then stick to the blank. 3 Adhere the thin and 3 thicker aperture together and fix to a 13 cm square white blank with 3D foam pads. Emboss another piece of cardstock. Trim some of the leaves and add to the edges of the frame. Add a strip of blue cardstock to the centre and add the sentiment on top.

## MAKE A WISH

1 Layer green card, 12 cm $\times 13.5 \mathrm{~cm}$, onto a 12.5 cm $\times 14 \mathrm{~cm}$ top-folding white blank. Cut a slightly smaller piece of blue, then follow the step-by-step to emboss the blue card. Die cut a circle aperture in the centre and fix to the base with 3D foam pads.
$2 \begin{aligned} & \text { Glue small strips of } \\ & \text { different coloured }\end{aligned}$ cardstock to the right of the panel. Die cut 'Wish' from white card, then emboss in the embossing folder. Arrange the sentiment to fit inside the aperture.

Embossing folders are really useful for a whole range of techniques. Not only can you use them to create embossed and debossed papers, you can ink both sides of the folder to produce different textures. Plus, you can emboss die-cut sentiments, cut out embossed elements and scatter embossing powder to achieve a beautiful effect. Here, I demonstrate a mix of these techniques to show you that there's more to embossing folders than meets the eye.

## Keep it simple

For a less complicated design without several embossed layers, gently roll ink over the raised side of the folder and, after embossing in a die-cutting machine, sprinkle over embossing powder. Don't have a die-cutting machine? You can still use embossing folders - apply pressure with a rolling pin or mallet and you'll get a great effect! Don't worry about any excess powder remaining as it adds to the look.

# Souk soirée 

# Add a little Moroccan ambience to your next get-together with these easy-peasy papercrafts 

のt's time to get the party started! Moroccan-inspired hues and repeat patterns give these handmade gift bags and candle decorations a warm, harmonious look, and the pops of metallic gold offer a sun-kissed glow. Our makes are perfect for a bit of escapism - forget about the freezing weather outside and craft your way to the souks of Marrakech.

## GIFT BAGS

Fold in 9 cm on A4 landscape paper, then again on the other side to meet the edge with a 1 cm overlap and secure. Placing your hand inside, refold and flatten the bag 3 cm away from the first folds. Open the bag and press the narrow gusset between the folds to the inside, creasing to make a concertina gusset.


Fold up the bottom edge of the bag by 3 cm and 4.5 cm . Unfold, fold back the top layer only on the 4.5 cm line and place your finger inside the gap to push the folded ends flat against the 3 cm fold line.
3 Press down the sides of the tray shape and crease the diagonal edges to make a flattened octagon. Fold in the top and bottom edges along the 3 cm line and secure. Fold down the top edge of the base of the bag so the gussets can be opened and the container will stand up. $\psi$ Decorate the front of the 4 bag with lengths of washi tape and sections of metallic-sprayed doily, folding in line with the creases of the bag so that it can be stored flat.

## WASHI JARS

1 Using a straight-sided 1 coloured candle jar, fix a length of taut washi tape around the base, overlapping the ends and trimming neatly with a craft knife.
2 Add a second strip of a 2 different pattern in the same way. Continue to add washi tape, matching up the patterns if possible. Carefully
burnish the tape down with a bone folder or your thumbnail.

## DOILY JARS

1 Place a paper doily onto newspaper and spray with metallic paint. Leave to dry before respraying for perfect coverage. Wrap the doily around a coloured candle jar and crease around the bottom edge. Remove and cut along the crease line.
Paste the back of the cut 2 doily with diluted PVA glue, before replacing around the jar and gently smoothing into place with a damp cloth to remove excess glue.

## KITTY FRAMPTON SAYS: Cute

 characters will certainly do the job; who could resist this little garden mouse? Simply take a white blank, 13 cm square, and trim pink patterned paper to 12.5 cm square. Die cut a stitched circle from white, then a larger pierced circle. Apply beige ink all over the smaller circle, then fix a brick wall stencil over the top and brush through some brown ink. Layer the circle onto the larger one, then onto the pink panel. Die cut grass from green, then adhere onto the card. Wrap baker's twine around the panel and secure. Stamp the images onto white, colour in and trim. Secure in place with 3D foam pads. Stamp a sentiment onto white and fix to the centre, then add pearls to finish.

build a die-cutting sandwich. |t'l| ensure that you're applying an even pressure and keeping the edges of your dies in good working order. The Shim Assortment Pack from Kit ' N ' Caboodle is a great affordable option

How can I incorporate papercutting in my cardmaking?


COLETTE SMITH SAYS:
I simply love how impactful papercut silhouettes are, especially when paired with an inky background. The detail involved with papercutting might seem daunting to newbies, but follow my method using tracing paper and you'll be snipping your way to perfection. You don't need a lot of supplies to get started; in fact, most of the items you will already have in your craft stash. The key to successful papercutting is a sharp knife, time and, most importantly, patience. It can be quite time-consuming depending on the intricacy, but it is still a very relaxing craft that produces stunning results. Papercutting has never been easier with cardmaker Colette Smith's simple step-by-step

Have you got any tips on how I can make my sentiments pop?


ANNE-MARIE CATTERALL SAYS: You can create some really fabulous dimensional effects with die-cut words, which can really help them
pop. One of my favourite ways is to die cut your chosen sentiment five or six times and layer them on top of one another to achieve a stunning 3D effect. I recommend using a wet glue so you can line them up perfectly. Another way to make sentiments stand out is to keep the background of your card vibrant yet simple, and using black
cardstock for your die-cuts.
Combining the two
techniques gives your designs a rather striking look. If you don't have black cardstock use a marker pen to colour the sentiment in.

## CORINNE BRADD SAYS:

We've all used those handy sheets of 3D foam pads to add depth to our cards without having to find a bigger envelope to accommodate the extra
thickness, but what do you do when you want a really punchy card? Fold out card methods such as a tri-shutters or stepper cards allow you to add dimension to the face of your design whilst still being thin enough to post. Once you've measured, scored and folded your blank accurately, these styles can be decorated with a number of different disciplines from stamping to parchment craft, turning the flattest crafts into 3D displays, whilst still being suitable for posting.

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## Quick jargon buster

BRADS: paper fasteners with split pins that pierce paper then pull apart to secure on the reverse
DECOUPAGE: strips of paper are pasted to cover an object, or creating a 3D image by layering paper, where the smaller parts of a repeated image are cut out and added to the original image for a raised effect
DIE-CUTTING: a die-cutting machine cuts out shapes from paper, card and other materials. Sandwich a metal die over your material then feed it through the machine. The pressure on the die creates the cut

MATTING: the method of layering different sizes of paper or card pieces together
ORIGAMI: the traditional Japanese art of folding paper to create 3D shapes
SANDING: using a sanding block to create a rough texture on the face or edges of a piece of card
SCORING: the method of running a scoring tool over a piece of card to create a straight line that can then be folded

Accordion-fold a strip of patterned paper, $4.5 \mathrm{~cm} x$ 30 cm , then score at 2.5 cm intervals


Gather the folds into a cone and flatten by gently pressing in the centre


Glue a paper circle to
the front and back of the rosette. Use a needle and thread to stitch a button to the centre

The first thing you notice about illustrator Alice Potter's fun prints are their childlike characteristics. Cute animals, flowers and letter drawings are what she is most recognisable for. So, fans will be pleased to hear she has added children's book illustrator to her string of bows and will be releasing four pop-up books featuring her adorable designs in 2019.

 HER HEART"I think my work appeals to both adults and children, but my passion is creating children's illustrations so my recent work has them in mind," says Alice. "I love illustrating cute characters and animals, and kids love them. My favourite is a bear ready for exploring the wilderness. It showcases my passion and skills in one illustration."

She may be Potter by name but is definitely not by nature. Alice explains that drawing has always been her calling. "While studying Textile Design at Chelsea

College of Arts, I subconsciously produced illustrative designs," she recalls. "However, it wasn't until a few years after graduating that I took a course in Illustration and discovered it was what I wanted to do."
Based in London, Alice's first illustration strongly resembles her British roots. "I drew two characters drinking tea to accompany an article about catching up with your friends," she says. "Getting that first commission is always memorable. It leads to more opportunities and confirms you are heading in the right direction."
But it's the variety that keeps Alice on her toes. "One moment I am designing greeting cards, the next picture books for kids or illustrations for a major coffee retailer. It's always interesting but equally hard work."

## POSITIVITY IS KEY

"I'm a firm believer in the benefits of positive mentality and how that impacts a career," insists Alice. "There have been hard times in the past when I was too negative, rather than treating those moments as simply quiet and the perfect time to develop awesome new work which would reap benefits in the future. Illustration is a competitive field and you have to work extremely hard to stand out."
A cheery outlook may influence her success, but what's her design secret? "I try and keep up to date with trends and colours. I always start with rough sketches, then create the final artwork using either Adobe Illustrator on my Wacom tablet or Procreate on my iPad Pro."
Alice reveals everyday tools she couldn't live without too. "My favourite pencils are Pentel Graphgear," she says. "I also use


Pigma Micron pens for black line drawings. I don't think you need anything fancy to create art really."
