



How to use your exclusive gift

COLOUR WITH CONFIDENCE

Thanks to the versatility of inks to add an the collection, you can really experiment with your stamping technique. Print an image multiple times over your card to create quick backgrounds, or why not select just one motif to achieve statement and bleeding. If you're toppers? For splashes of vibrancy, I like to use marker pens to colour in my images and distress

eve-catching blended look, Remember, if vou're colouring in with alcohol markers, stamp your motif using a dye-based ink such as Memento to avoid any smearing applying watercolours, however, be sure to use a waterproof permanent ink.

EMBOSSED ACCENTS

To ensure your motifs stand out even more. complement the stamps with embossing powders. Easy to use, you'll achieve professional results in a flash. Simply stamp your motif, sprinkle over white embossing powder, shake off the excess and set with a heat tool. You can then apply inks over the top. If you're colouring in with

watercolours or water-based pigments. heat embossing can really help to make the inks stay within the lines. Before you get started, don't forget to wipe your card base with an anti-static tool. The static attracts embossing powders, so can spread to unwanted areas of your design.

You will need

- > Craft essentials (see p94)
- Dies: My Favorite Things Mini Cloud Edges: oval
- Ink pads: Distress Oxide: Memento inks: clear embossing
- > Embossing powder: white, gold
- > Fineliner, black
- > Anti-static tool
- Acetate

BLOOM

Trim white card to 12.5cm square, stamp leaves around the edges in black and colour in. Secure the panel onto a 13cm square blank. Die cut an oval from white, stamp a sentiment in the centre and colour in. Fix to the centre of the card front with 3D foam pads.

TOP TIP

Leave a white edge around your stamped images for added impact



PRETTY TRAIL

Cut white card to 12.5cm square, then prepare with an anti-static tool. Stamp flowers onto the card with clear embossing ink multiple times to fill the entire panel. Pour over white embossing powder, tip off the excess and set with a heat tool.

Apply Festive Berries distress ink onto acetate and spritz with water. Dab the ink onto the embossed piece, then dry with a heat tool. Spritz the background with water, then dab off any

excess with a clean paper towel.

Z Once dry, adhere to the centre of a 13cm square blank. Stamp several flowers onto white card in black ink. colour in, then trim ensuring to leave a white border all around.

) | Fix the flowers to the card front, some with 3D foam pads, some with tape for dimension. Stamp a sentiment onto a strip of white using Rose Bud distress ink, trim into a diagonal at one end and secure.

FRESH AS A DAISY

Create a white blank. 9.5cm x 14.5cm, and cut a slightly smaller panel for the background. Stamp a ladybird with clear embossing ink. Print the same motif once again onto masking paper, then cut out. Attach the mask over the ladybird on the card.

Stamp a flower and bee in clear embossing ink, then draw in a stem using a black fineliner. Press the leaves with the same ink, then remove the ladybird

mask and colour in all of the images.

Z Draw in a trail behind the bee with a black fineliner. Add some grass at the bottom of the panel, flicking the pens upwards. Use a cloud mask and Tumbled Glass distress ink to create the sky.

Fix the finished panel onto the front of the greeting. Stamp a sentiment onto white in black ink and cut into a diagonal at one end. Adhere to the card with 3D foam pads.



THINKING OF YOU

Take a panel of white, 9cm x 14cm, and stamp flowers and a butterfly in black ink. Press the butterfly again onto a separate piece of white and colour the motifs in. Trim the left wing of the butterfly and put to one side.

Using a cloud mask, create the sky using Tumbled Glass distress ink, avoiding the images. Adhere the panel onto the front of a white blank, 10cm x 14cm, leaving an equal border along the top and bottom.

Z Stamp a sentiment onto a smaller piece of white in clear embossing ink, cut into a diagonal at one end and add to the card front with 3D foam pads. Secure the extra butterfly wing, ensuring it lies flat where the wing joins the body and is slightly raised towards the edge.



HAPPY DAYS

Stamp bunnies onto white card in brown ink. Blend Peeled Paint distress ink around the edges and add to a card front, 11cm x 14cm. Press 'Happy days' onto a strip of white in black and secure to the card. Print flowers onto white, colour in, then cut out. Fix to the sentiment strip to finish.



TOP TIP

Lift the wings of the butterfly to create extra dimension

WARMEST WISHES

Take a 10.5cm x 14cm panel of white card and prepare with an anti-static tool. Stamp the large flower around the edges in clear embossing ink and pour over gold embossing powder. Shake off the excess and heat-set.

Colour the flowers in, then blend Carved Pumpkin distress ink around the edges. Adhere the panel onto the front of a 10.5cm x 14cm blank with double-sided tape.

Prepare an 8cm x 11.5cm panel of white card with an anti-static tool. Stamp a butterfly and sentiment in embossing ink and cover with gold embossing powder. Shake off the excess and heat set.

Blend Carved Pumpkin distress ink around the edges and colour in the butterfly motif. Adhere the panel onto the centre of the card front with 3D foam pads.





bonus Tattered Lace paper book! There these spring-themed designs perfectly.



CONGRATULATIONS

Cut white card to 10cm square and prepare with an anti-static pad. Stamp 'Congratulations' repeatedly in clear embossing ink, pour over white embossing powder, shake off the excess and set with a heat tool.

Take a piece of acetate and dab Spiced Marmalade ink onto it, then spritz with water. Dab the

ink from the acetate onto the embossed panel, then dry with a heat tool. Repeat with Carved Pumpkin ink, then adhere the panel onto a 10.5cm square blank.

Stamp a duck onto white in black, colour in and trim, leaving a small white border around the edges. Fix the duck to the card with 3D foam pads to finish.



WHAT'S UP BUTTERCUP?

Trim white card to 10.5cm x 14cm. Dab Peeled Paint distress ink onto acetate. spritz with water, then apply to the card. Cover the entire panel and dry off with a heat tool.

Stamp foliage around the edges in Pear Tart ink, then adhere to a 10.5cm x 14cm blank with double-sided tape. Trim white to 8.5cm x 12cm, then stamp a horse and sentiment in clear embossing ink.

Z Print the horse's head onto masking paper and trim. Position over the horse's head on the main panel. Stamp a sprig, then remove the mask. Colour in the motifs and add the panel onto the centre of the card front, 10.5cm x 14cm, with 3D foam pads.

SPRING HAS SPRUNG

Create a 10cm x 18cm blank and stamp a ladybird over the card front in clear embossing ink. Colour in the ladybirds and draw in trails behind some of them using a black fineliner.

Cut two 6.5cm squares of white card. Stamp a lamb onto one, a chick and sentiment onto the other, with clear embossing ink. Colour in the images and add some grass beneath the animals, blending the green outwards with a water brush.

Blend Tumbled Glass distress ink around the edges of the squares and the edge of the card front. Adhere the squares onto the greeting with 3D foam pads.

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

EASY GATEFOLD


Trim white card to 14cm x 23cm. Score down from the long side at 4cm and 19cm, then fold the score lines inwards to create a gatefold greeting. Cover the inside and front panels with black spotty paper.

Cut green snail paper, 13cm x 14cm, round off the corners with a punch and attach to the inside of the card. Fix striped paper, 6cm x 15cm, down the centre. Add an oval sentiment topper on top with 3D foam pads.

Trim two pieces of green foliage paper, 3cm x 13cm, round off the corners and attach to the front panels. Adhere strips of striped and green snail paper along the centre of the front panels, then attach a length of black ribbon.

Fix a bee sticker to the oval topper and add a butterfly sticker to the left front panel with 3D foam pads. Embellish with gold gems to complete.





FOAM PHRASE

Layer orange floral paper onto a 13cm x 17cm top-folding white blank. Trim a decorative panel to 11.5cm x 14.5cm, round off the corners with a punch, then attach.

2 Cut striped paper, 3cm x 17cm, and adhere across the bottom. Fix a floral sticker to the left and attach a strip of bicycles on top. Thread baker's twine through a sentiment tag and attach to the top-left corner. Add a baker's twine bow and button on the end.

Secure a small sentiment sticker and butterfly sticker above the tag. Attach a bicycle topper to the right with 3D foam pads, then add foam letters underneath. Finish with gold gems.



POP-UP BUTTERFLY

Cover a top-folding white blank, 13cm x 17cm, with blue spotty paper. Trim yellow floral paper to 12cm x 16cm, then round off the corners with a punch.

Attach striped paper, 4cm x 17cm, across the centre. Die cut a 5.5cm oval through the layers towards the right-hand side. Tuck yellow ribbon behind each side of the aperture, then fix to the card front.

3 Secure ribbon across the striped paper, then add a bow to the left-hand side of the aperture. Die cut a sentiment into a 4.5cm oval, then glue to the aperture.

Fix a small strip of acetate to the reverse of a butterfly sticker, fold it in half then attach to the aperture. Add another butterfly sticker towards the top-right of the oval. Embellish with a button and gold gems.

Five more CARDS to come



SCALLOPED

Create a 4cm x 11cm top-folding blank. Lav an 11cm scalloped oval die on top so that the centre of the fold remains intact, then cut. Cover the front with blue patterned paper, die cut with the same scalloped oval die.

Trim the base of the blank flat at the back to ensure it stands up. Die cut an 8.5cm diameter oval from beige chevron paper, layer onto a vellow oval, then adhere to the card front.

Adhere a strip of patterned paper across the bottom of the card. Attach flowers and foliage down the right with 3D foam pads and add a bow. Attach a girl sticker next to the flowers.

) | Fix a sentiment to the left using foam stickers. Secure foliage and a sentiment sticker underneath, then add a button to the centre of the bow. Finish with gold gems.

HALF FRONT

Create a 12cm x 18cm white blank and trim the width of the front to 6cm. Cover the front and inside with green foliage paper. Cut house paper to 11cm x 17cm, round off the corners and attach to the inside.

Trim floral paper, 5cm x 17cm, round off the corners and fix to the card front. Run ribbon down the left, then add a bow to the centre. Cut three toppers to 5cm square, round off the corners and layer onto black foliage paper.

Z Attach the square toppers to the front with 3D foam pads. Add stickers to each topper and adhere foam stickers to the right. Secure a button to the centre of the bow, then finish with gold gems.

VALLEY FOLD

Trim white card to 17cm x 24cm and score down from the long side at 4cm, 8cm, 16cm and 20cm. Valley fold the inside score lines and mountain fold the outside score lines. Cover the back and front panels with pink spotty paper and the side panels with pink floral paper.

2 Cut two panels of pink chevron paper, 3cm x 16cm, round off the corners, then attach to the front panels. Trim a 3cm x 16cm strip of spotty paper and fix along the centre.

Die cut a scalloped oval from pink chevron paper, then adhere a piece of acetate, 8cm x 17cm, to the back. Secure to the centre of the spotty paper strip, then run black ribbon across it.

Add foam sentiment stickers to the acetate. Adhere an oval topper to the scalloped oval with 3D foam pads, then attach a butterfly sticker to the right. Finish with gold gems.

Ways with acetate

Applying card toppers and stickers with acetate is a surefire way to give your greetings extra depth. For a really dramatic effect, simply glue your motifs to long thin strips of acetate, secure to the card and watch as they spring out. Why not also try using acetate to create statement sentiments? Similar to the card below, adhere the acetate between two card edges and finish with wording to make it look as if the embellishments are floating. It's a fun trick on the eye and makes for a clever effect.



SIMPLE STICKERING

Cover a write blank, 15cm square, with yellow Cover a white blank, striped paper. Trim girl paper to 14cm square, then round off the corners. Secure to the card front.

Adhere striped paper, 5cm x 15cm, to the top of the card. Cut contrasting paper to 3.5cm x 15cm and adhere on top. Wrap ribbon around the papers, then add a bow to the left.

Fix a sentiment to the top-right corner and add foam stickers around it. Attach a girl sticker underneath the sentiment with 3D foam pads. Add a button to the bow and finish with gold gems.

FLORAL TAG

Cover an 11cm x 17cm top-folding white blank with diamond paper. Cut strawberry paper to 10cm x 16cm, then round off the corners with a punch. Secure a tag to the top-right and fix to the card.

Trim striped paper, 5cm x 17cm, and adhere down the centre. Add a strip of strawberries on top. Glue a sentiment to a tag with 3D foam pads, thread baker's twine through the top, then fix to the card. Wrap the baker's twine over the top of the card and attach a bow to the top of the tag. Add strawberry stickers to the sentiment with acetate, then add a snail sticker and a small sentiment sticker. Embellish with gold gems to finish.

TOP TIP

Use the gift tag ephemera as toppers for your cards







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
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Be all heart

Step away from the rectangle and make a feature of this classic Valentine's Day



You will need

- Craft essentials (see p94)
- Template from paper craftermagazine.co.uk
- Paper collection, Craft Consortium The Essential Craft Papers, Watercolours
- Dies: Xcut Nesting Hearts, Wedding Alphabet & Numbers; First Edition Decorative Love
- Mirrored hearts, Tim Holtz Idea-ology
- Mirri card, silver
- Acetate



FLOATING HEART

Create a 15cm square top-folding white blank, then score horizontal lines 5cm down from the fold on both sides of the card and cover the panels with patterned paper. Die cut the point of a heart through the fold of the card, making sure it's cut above the score lines. Sandwich acetate behind the aperture, then adhere the folded section together.

Valley fold the score lines so the card stands up. Die cut varying sizes of hearts from pink card and patterned paper, layer up, then attach to the acetate so it looks like it's floating. Add a mirrored heart in the centre. Die cut a heart balloon and fix it to the top

of the floating heart with concertina-folded acetate so it springs up. Die cut three small hearts, attach to strips of acetate, then add to the back of the floating heart.

Trim red card, 5cm

Trim red card, 5cm x 15cm, adhere across the front panel and layer patterned paper on top. Die cut hearts from card and patterned paper, matt together, then secure across the panel. Die cut 'Be mine' in silver mirri card and a heart from pink card. Attach across a 2.5cm wide strip of white card. Mountain fold and valley fold each end, then trim a pennant into each end. Adhere to complete.

TRIPLE TROUBLE

Create a triple easel greeting as shown in our step-by-step. Die cut hearts from pink and red card, then adhere to the card fronts. Die cut smaller hearts from patterned paper and attach on top. Cut a small red heart and fix to the base of the card at the front with 3D foam pads to create a stopper.

Die cut two lips and stick to the first two hearts with strips of folded acetate. Die cut letters and a heart from silver mirri card, then a slightly larger heart from dark pink. Attach across a 2.5cm wide strip of white card to spell out 'I love you'.

3 Mountain fold and valley fold each end, trim a pennant into each end and fix the panel to the largest heart. Die cut cupid from red card and hearts in red, pink and silver mirri, then stick to strips of acetate. Attach the strips behind the hearts and add a mirrored heart to the stopper.

AT AN ANGLE

Using the template from our website, create a heart-shaped white blank. Cover the front with purple card. Trim a smaller patterned paper heart, then adhere on top. Die cut four hearts from card and patterned paper, layer up, then attach to the front with 3D foam pads. Add a mirrored heart on top.

Die cut 'Valentine' from silver mirri card. Stick the letters across a 2.5cm wide strip of white card. Mountain fold and valley fold each end, snip a pennant into each end, then attach diagonally across the card front. Die cut small hearts from coloured and silver mirri card. Adhere them to strips of acetate, then secure behind the card front to finish.

Fold A4 card in half lengthways. Lay on three different sized heart dies, sat next to each other just above the fold. Tape in place and run through a die-cutting machine



Remove each heart-folded blank from the die-cutting machine. Fold the front of each heart blank in half



Die cut three hearts the same size, then adhere to the folded fronts. Fold the point of each heart forwards



From patterned paper, die cut three hearts and fix inside each card. Starting with the largest card, glue the base of the next card inside, then repeat with the smallest card



SARAH'S TOP TIPS

Change of heart

Classic cards have their place, but I'm a sucker for shaped cards to mix things up a bit. You can take the easy route by simply creating a heart-shaped blank, which will end up sitting at a jaunty angle. I couldn't leave it there though - I also added some miniature, protruding hearts for more excitement. I've demonstrated two more advanced techniques too: a floating heart card and triple easel greeting. Both of these take a bit more concentration but are a doddle once you get the hang of them.

Word up

For each of these heartfelt greetings, it was important to make sure the sentiments sang amongst all of the Valentine's excitement. So I created white banners, which worked as excellent backdrops for the silver mirri card letters. All you need to do is mountain fold and valley fold each end of a white card strip and snip a 'v' to create the look. One more bit of advice - die cut all of your hearts and motifs before you start piecing the cards together to save a lot of back-and-forth.

- ★ If you do get little stray bits of powder over your work and you can't brush them away, keep a pin handy and just touch them gently, then blow them away
- ★ Allow your heat tool to warm up first before using it as this helps to prevent your card from warping
- ★ Hold the heat tool in an upright position until you see the powder melt, then move it around your design. At times, I prefer to heat my card from underneath, especially with glitters and ultra high powders
- ★ It's always best to under-do your heat application rather than overdo it as you can always go back and apply a little more. If you find your powder looks dull, you've overdone it
- ★ Experiment! Play with the powders, mix colours together and add SPARKLES Premium Glitters to achieve your own unique embossed effects. We even offer static-free jars to create your own combos

Quick fixers

How can I prevent my card from warping?

Marion says: This is caused by moisture from the paper and the ink pad. All you have to do is turn it over and heat from the other side. You will find this flattens it out, but depending on the thickness of your card you may have to do this a couple of times.

Despite using anti-static powders, I still get small flecks on my work?

Marion says: Always handle your card from the edges. WOW! Embossing powders, Glitters and SPARKLES are all static-free, but they are attracted to fingerprints and any form of moisture or oil. Never decant the powders into other plastic containers as this will put the static straight back in.

I have used inks to create my base. How can I speed up the drying time before I emboss the panel?

Marion says: You need to make sure the ink is completely dry before applying any embossing powder. A quick solution for this is to rub a little talcum powder over it to help absorb the moisture. If you have any talc residue after embossing, simply brush it off.



3 Remove the stencil, sprinkle over pink embossing powder, tap off any excess and heat-set

4 Mount onto various coloured card, then onto a white 9cm x 15cm blank. Add a die-cut sentiment, bow and gems to finish

What Is Embossing?

Most people think it is used exclusively in the papercraft world, which five years ago they would have almost certainly been correct.

However, since then our Designers and Mixologists have been working hard to come up with powders and techniques that can be used on far more than just papercraft applications.

In fact, it is being used on all sorts of substrates now and the powders have become a must-have for mixed media artists who can use it in many different ways too.

Grade Sizes Explained

Regular (R) – All our powders are available in this grade. The particles are made the correct size to suit most applications.

Superfine (SF) - When the Regular grade powder overflows the edge of a line or character, a Superfine or 'Detail' powder is required to give a crisp image. It will not give the highest raise but, on a thin line, it will feel just as high as the regular product.

Ultra High (UH) - This grade is a very chunky product. It is used for the triple embossing technique and when a large area is to be embossed. It will give a high raise but can't be used with regular or detailed stamps.

Powder Properties Explained

We make our powders with either a translucent or a white raw material. The different bases have different properties which make it possible to achieve all the wonderful effects.

Translucent (T) - These powders will allow light through them and so the colour under them will affect the finished result.

Opaque (O) - These powders will not let light through and so when embossing they will not be affected by the colour under them.

Marbling (M) - These powders have a white base and so when moulding the white will appear, producing some fantastic marble effects.

Create a 13cm square top-folding white blank. Apply green distress ink to the bottom of white stamping card, 12.5cm square, and blue to the top. Blend the colours with a stencil brush.

STEP TWO

Draw a thin border around the edge with a fineliner pen, then mount the panel onto blue card. Stamp and colour each element, cut them out and secure in place with 3D foam pads.

STEP THREE

Stamp 'Today is' and 'A good day to be happy' onto white strips of card, then fix to the top and bottom of the greeting with 3D foam pads. Add glitter to the butterfly wings to finish.



Painterly botanicals

Give watercolours a go with Nikki Strange and create an abstract keepsake for your abode

earn how to ace the trendiest technique around from the comfort of your craft room in just four simple steps. Using vibrant colour combinations and the wet-on-wet technique, recreate the butterfly-like, geometric leaves and small flowers of the dainty purple shamrock. While repetitive in shape, you can achieve a varied dimension by blending pigments together to give your masterpiece a lovely abstract feel.

You will need

- Templates from paper craftermagazine.co.uk
- Watercolour inks: violet, brown, pink, green, blue
- » Brushes: round, oval
- > Card, watercolour
- Mixing palette



Print out the template from our website and sketch the plant onto watercolour card with a pencil. Mix purple watercolour ink with a little brown and apply to the outer edges of the leaves. Combine purple with pink ink and drop into the centre of the leaves



Whilst the page is still wet, add darker purple ink again to the edges of the leaves. Let the colours combine slightly; ensure you can still see the light purple. Let the page dry a little, then continue to shade the leaves, adding darker purple sections to each one



Take a smaller round brush and add a layer of water to the stalks, then add the purple and brown mix so that it flows along the narrow line of water. Using the same technique, apply diluted purple to the small flowers



Mix blue ink with green and use an oval brush to paint a horizontal line to the base of the planter. Drag the pigment upwards with a clean brush to fill in the rest of the pot. Apply more ink to the base and edges, leaving a gap at the top and bottom. Let it dry, then apply brown ink to the soil

ROYAL TOPPERS

Cover a 10.5cm x 15cm portrait blank with our castle paper, arranging it so that one motif is in the top-left corner. Add the heart border strip to the top and bottom of the card, butting one end up to the castle.

Matt our prince and princess design onto thin card and cut around them to leave a narrow border. Place the motif in the centre of the greeting with 3D foam pads. Mount flowers onto thin card, trim as before and place bottomleft and between the couple.





Strengthen the boards of an A5 landscape ruled exercise book by glueing sheets of thin card over the top. Cover each board with our frog print, folding the edges to the inside and mitring the corners. Cover the joins at the spine with coordinating paper.

Mount our 'Once upon Mount our Once apon a time' sentiment onto thin card and cut out. Fix this to the bottom-left of the front cover with 3D foam pads, adding mounted dragonfly motifs around it, to complete the story book.

Z To make a bookmark, trim one end of green card. 4cm x 10cm, into a point. Cut a thin channel 6mm in from the long and angled edges, starting 3cm down from the flat short edge to make a 'paperclip'. Fix a card-mounted frog to the top of the clip.

> DIAGONAL **PRINTS**

Cover the top two thirds of a 15cm x 21cm blank with our dragon paper. Trim floral paper at a 30° angle and fix to the bottom of the card, overlapping the dragons. Add a border strip to the base of the greeting.

Mount a rainbow, castle, fairy and our 'Have a magical birthday' sentiment onto thin card and cut out. Tape a 2cm high metal spring to the back of the fairy and glue the other end to the top-right of the card, adding cut-out flower motifs over the end of the spring.

3 Add the remaining motifs around the card with 3D foam pads, placing the sentiment bottom-right and trimming with cut-out stars.





Cover the top half of a 10.5cm x 15cm landscape blank with dragon paper. positioning it so that a motif extends beyond the fold.

Trim the paper at the top fold of the card, cutting around the motif. Snip around the hills and trees of our pumpkin coach print and add this to the bottom half of the card.

Cut around some additional tree designs and adhere these to the right of the greeting, before layering a cut-out panel of floral paper bottom-right. Mount our 'Thank you' sentiment onto thin card, then cut around the border. Fix this to the bottom-right of the card with 3D foam pads.

HANGING AROUND

Cut a cloud shape from card, 11cm x 19cm. Cover one side with our pumpkin carriage print and the other with unicorn patterned paper, positioning the motifs in the centre of the shape. Punch a small hole in the top of the card and five holes along the bottom edge.

) Die cut ten 7.5cm wide circular motifs from the papers, then five 8.5cm wide scalloped circles from coordinating card. Fix the motifs to either side of the card and punch a hole in the top of each.

Z Use three strands of embroidery thread to tie the discs to the bottom of the mobile, varying the heights so the circles can move freely. Add a loop of thread to the top hole to hang up the mobile.

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

Exploding box card

Using beautiful shades of red and pop-out heart toppers, Colette Smith demonstrates how to shower your other half with affection. If illustrations aren't your thing, you can use stickers or die-cuts. Plus, you can add as many motifs as you wish. What better way to show your appreciation for the one you love?



Download and print the words 'Love', 'XOXO' and 'Adore' from our website. Colour them in and cut out



Print the heart shapes several times, then colour them in and cut them out



Trim narrow strips of acetate, 5mm x 10cm, and attach one end to the back of each motif and word



Print the box template and trace around it onto red card, marking the score and cut lines. Repeat with another piece of card and cut each one out



Score along the marked lines and trim the cut lines to create the top flaps



Stick a side tab to the inside of the opposing rectangle, then repeat with the other tab to create a tall rectangular box



Cut four rectangles from two different shades of pale red card, 6.5cm x 8cm. Fix one to the inside of each top flap



Trim four strips of red card, 1.5cm x 9cm, and score 1cm in from each end. Glue each tab to the inside of the rectangular box, 1cm from the top



Fix each motif to the inner supports. Decorate the flaps and sides of the box with additional motifs




Marker Airbrush

Keren Baker puts four techniques to the test with this nifty tool by We R Memory Keepers

> he Marker Airbrush works by squeezing air onto the nibs of pens. There's an inner barrel that can be removed for thicker pens, offering plenty of versatility. Depending on how hard you squeeze or how close the pen is to the surface, the concentration of the splatter will change. Why not try out four fun techniques? Spray the ink through a stencil, create masks from Post-it notes – we demonstrate individual motifs and stripes before using embossed images as a resist. Get going, crafters...

- Pens: Aqua Flow Fresh Green, Wild Phlox, Flamingo Pink, Aqua Splash, Spiced Ginger, Red Apple; gel, white

CLOUD MASKS

Create an 11cm x 16.5cm white blank. Cut out a smaller laver of white cardstock. Punch clouds from Post-it notes and arrange onto the panel.


Insert a blue Aqua Flow pen into the Marker Airbrush and squeeze to dispense the colour over the area. Remove the cloud masks and, once dry, fix to the blank.

Die cut lots of circles, 🗸 in two sizes, from

different coloured cardstock. Trim tinv triangles and add to the base of each circle to create balloons. Apply details with a white gel pen. Arrange the circles onto the card, using 3D foam pads to adhere

some of them. Draw strings down from each balloon.

Stamp 'Happy birthday To you' onto a small strip of black cardstock with Versamark, add white embossing powder and heat-set. Adhere to the card with 3D foam pads.



LEAF SILHOUETTES

Make a 13cm x 15.5cm white blank. Matt with a purple layer, followed by a smaller teal layer. Cut out a slightly smaller panel of white cardstock. Stamp leaves in Versamark

onto the white, sprinkle white embossing powder on top and heat-set. Stamp more leaves in teal and purple ink, then cut out.

2 Using the Marker Airbrush, spritz green and purple ink onto the panel – apply the purple near the stems and the green further out. Adhere the stamped leaves using 3D foam pads. Stamp 'Thank you very much' onto a thin piece of black cardstock with Versamark. Add white embossing powder and heat-set. Adhere to the card with 3D foam pads.



ON THE DIAGONAL

Apply a smaller layer of teal cardstock to a white 12.5cm x 16.5cm tent-fold blank, then cut out a slightly smaller piece of white cardstock. Secure a strip of cardstock or a Post-it note at an angle to create a covered space, ensuring the rest of the card is covered too. Add a small rectangle mask in the centre.

2 Insert an AquaFlow pen into the Marker Airbrush and apply the colour to the unmasked area. Once satisfied with the coverage, move the masks to create the next stripe. Add a new colour into the Marker Airbrush and continue applying colour until nearly at the centre. Leave some space without stripes, then finish adding the colours.

3 Remove the central mask and adhere the panel to the greeting. Die cut 'Wish' from black. Stamp 'Have fun on your birthday' onto a thin piece of black cardstock with Versamark, sprinkle white embossing powder on top and heat-set. Add to the card using 3D foam pads, then arrange the die-cut letters centrally above.

TOP TIP

If there doesn't seem to be much colour coming from the airbrush, lower the nib so there's more below the airflow


STENCILLED DIAMONDS

Fix a smaller layer of orange cardstock to a white 12cm x 16.5cm blank and trim a smaller piece of white cardstock. Secure a diamond stencil onto the white panel with a little washi tape. Add bits of scrap cardstock around the other areas so the ink only goes through the stencil, then use the Marker Airbrush to spritz the area with colour.

Once you have enough of the colour, move the stencil and repeat with a different hue until you get the desired effect. Die cut a circle from the centre of the airbrushed piece, then a pink frame to go around the edge. Adhere the panel to the greeting.

Stick the pink frame in place. Add 3D foam pads to the die-cut circle and adhere to the card. Cut out strips of thin cardstock in different colours and affix to the circle and left edge of the greeting.

Die cut 'Hooray' in black and adhere. Stamp 'Huge congratulations' onto a thin strip of black card using Versamark, add white embossing powder and heat-set. Fix to the card using 3D foam pads to complete.










Don't forget to increase the pressure of your nib – or use a slightly darker shade – towards the centre of each flower.

Consider what you're going to pair your coloured-in digi stamps with. For these springtime makes, Kitty has used a myriad of layers including a couple of paper doilies and doily-esque ribbon. Not only do they apply a faux die-cut look, but they add texture and a vintage aesthetic too.

THINK INK





design is a smashing example. Complete with uplifting hues and pop-up motifs, your recipient will be greeted with a cheerful surprise as they open the envelope. What's more, there's a whole host of techniques to try in one project. Master shaped greetings, craft with embossing folders and get creative with your stash of dies.

CAN YOU TELL US HOW YOU GOT INTO CARDMAKING?

I've been crafting ever since I was a child, however I have only recently discovered die cutting, embossing and stamping. I've also developed a slight obsession with 3D exploding box cards as I find they tell a lovely little tale from the scenes created.

WHAT IS YOUR FAVOURITE **TECHNIQUE?**

As much as I love embossing, my favourite technique is illustrating and colouring in with alcohol markers. Adding my own illustrations to my greetings makes the design even more unique. I also cut out my own details when I'm missing a die. The ability to illustrate helps with this.

HAVE YOU GOT ANY TOP TIPS FOR YOUR 3D BOX CARD?

These card shapes are incredibly versatile, so you can really experiment with your technique. Opt for just one large pop-up detail to add in the centre or add a mixture of toppers using acetate to create a full



scene. Plus, why not use glitter card for added wow-factor?

HOW WERE YOU INSPIRED TO CREATE YOUR DESIGN?

This card was inspired by the Bonjour Chic set by Courtney Chilson from Sizzix - it just had to be a 'hello' card. I love working with colour and spearmint green is my favourite, so it became the base colour for my box card.

Galaxy backgrounds

Take Claire Richards' tutorial in one of the trendiest techniques around



Easy ways with inks!



EMBOSSED SKY

Apply patches of distress ink onto white card in Wilted Violet, Spun Sugar, Fossilized Amber and Peacock Feathers. Blend Chipped Sapphire around the edges and into the centre, then flick a little water onto the card and leave to dry.

Emboss the panel using a Shimmering Stars embossing folder, then trim to 11cm x 14cm and gently rub the stars with a nail file. Add distress inks to the stars and flick white paint

over the top using a Posca paint marker pen. Leave to dry.

Trim vellum to 6cm x 13cm and die cut a rounded scalloped edge from the top. Fold the sides around the bottom of the embossed panel, then fix to an 11.5cm x 14.5cm blank. Stamp and heat emboss

'Hooray! It's your birthday' using gold embossing powder.

Print a bear and planets onto white card, then colour in with marker pens and secure to the card front using 3D foam pads. Apply Glossy Accents to the bear's helmet and add sparkly sequins to finish.

STATEMENT SENTIMENT

1 Using the step-by-step as a guide, create a blended inked circle onto white card, 10.5cm x 13.5cm. Die cut an embroidered 'Hello' from the centre of the circle and embroider using silver thread and backstitch.

2 Stamp stars in grey ink around the edges of the card, then add fine glitter with a Wink of Stella brush pen. Adhere to an 11cm x 14cm pink blank.

TOP TIP

Cover up any visible glue marks with embellishments

WATERCOLOUR WASH

Trim watercolour card to 12.5cm square. To create a nebula effect, combine watercolour paints with plenty of water. Start with pink, purple and yellow across the middle, then apply layers of darker blue across the top and bottom. Leave to dry, then flick with white paint droplets.

Apply Imagination Crafts Sparkle Medium paste through a Shimmering Stars stencil with a palette knife and leave to dry. Trim the background to 12cm square, ensuring to leave some rough painted edges showing. Adhere to a 12.5cm square white blank.

Jusing light brown ink, stamp a planet onto white card, then blend Antique Linen distress ink over the top. Trim the edge and glue to the bottom-left corner of the greeting. Stamp a bear motif and colour in with marker pens. Apply Glossy Accents to the helmet and glitter to the balloon. Fix to the card front with 3D foam pads.

Die cut a 4.5cm circle of white card and stamp 'Dream big' in black. Print smaller stars around the sentiment in yellow, purple and blue ink, then adhere to the top-right of the card using 3D foam pads.

CLAIRE'S TOP TIPS

Keep it messy

The great thing about galaxy backgrounds is that there's really no need to be neat with your inking technique. Not only will you be layering your colours, the irregularity of hues actually adds to the ethereal effect. If you think you've made a mistake, you can more than likely blend it in. There's no right or wrong way, so this is your opportunity to have fun with both inks and watercolours, and experiment with the many effects you can achieve.

Starry eyed

There are various ways to complete your constellation scenes. Using a flicking motion, apply small specks of ink to your galaxy backgrounds with a white gel pen or paint to create abstract starry skies. If you're after a little more sparkle, you could even sprinkle over a little embossing glitter through a stencil and heat set it to give your make an out-of-this-world twinkle. What's more, embossing folders work well to achieve dimension and give your background impressive 3D results.

Whether you're a die-cutting devotee, embossing pro or stamping is more your thing, this sweet selection offers something for everyone. Each card has a unique sentiment, but why not change up the message and add personalised elements to your design for an extra special touch?



I LOVE YOU MAKER: TRACEY **DAYKIN-JONES**

Cover a 10.5cm x 15cm blank with patterned paper. Glue yellow ribbon across the card horizontally and fix a strip of pink scallop-edged paper above. Layer ribbon across the pink section and secure the ends to the inside of the card. Die cut 'I love you' from white card, then adhere onto the ribbon. Attach two hearts to the bottom-right of the sentiment and embellish with a silver gem to finish.



LAYERED HEARTS MAKER: COLETTE SMITH

Die cut a large and small heart from scrap card, then pop out the shapes. Secure the larger aperture onto a rectangle of white, 10.5cm x 15cm. Apply pink ink to the inside of the aperture with a stippling brush. Repeat on a different area of the card, continuing with the same colour and stencil until you are happy with the coverage. Repeat with the smaller stencil, using medium then dark pink ink to fill in the gaps. Matt the stencilled panel onto a tent-fold blank. Round off the bottom corners with a punch. Die cut nesting hearts from pink, layer and attach to the blank. Finish with a sentiment and bow.



MAKER: TRACEY DAYKIN-JONES Create a gatefold blank, 12cm square. and cover the outer panels with green polka dot patterned paper. Die cut a large circle from pink polka dot paper and cut in half, then adhere a semicircle to each outer panel. Die cut 'Love' from dark pink card and adhere to the left panel of the greeting with 3D foam pads. Tie green grosgrain ribbon around the top of the letter 'o' and add three silver gems to complete.

PAISLEY **BACKGROUNDS**

MAKER: SARA NAUMANN Apply green paint to a paisley block stamp and print onto white card, 10.5cm x 15cm. Allow to dry, then edge with green paint. Matt onto white, then green card. Fix a narrow white strip onto kraft card and glue across the stamped piece. Make a kraft card blank, 12.5cm x 18cm. Glue the stamped piece to the centre. Wrap twine around the panel, securing the ends to the card front. Stamp 'Love you' onto white card using green ink, trim to 4cm x 7cm and edge with green paint. Mount onto kraft card. Fix to the front using 3D foam pads and add a twine bow.







FEELING ROSY MAKER: ELIZABETH MOAD

Die cut 'L', 'O', 'V', 'E' from red card four times and layer together. Take pink paper, 3mm wide, and glue around the edges of the letters. Insert pink paper into a quilling tool and coil until the rose reaches 10mm wide. Fold at a right angle to the tool, then turn, lifting up the paper strip as you go. Make another fold at a right angle so the paper hangs close to the previous fold. Continue in this way. Trim the excess paper, fold the end and glue against the rose. Make 38 in pink, cream and red. Fix the sentiment onto a light pink heart, then mount onto dark pink.

YOU ARE INCREDIBLE

stamped focal in the centre.

MAKER: SARA NAUMANN Stamp a flower and sentiment onto white card, then cut out and paper piece with blue and white card. Glue the petals on top of the flower image, slightly offsetting them for more dimension. Mount onto black, green, white, teal and white card, then add gems. Form a black blank, 12.5cm square. Adhere gold metallic border stickers to the bottom and side of the card. Wrap with baker's twine and tie into a bow at the front. Secure the

EMBOSSED HEARTS

MAKER: COLETTE SMITH Emboss pink card, 10cm square, with a heart embossing folder. Lightly sand the surface and adhere to the inside of a white 10cm square blank. Trim away 3.5cm from the front panel. Die cut a 7.5cm heart and two smaller ones in different shades of pink card. Emboss hearts onto the smallest and sand. Layer the hearts and fix to the front of the card, ensuring they protrude from the side slightly. Secure a sentiment and gems to finish.

1 At full size, cut one plain heart from pale pink card and one chequered heart from a deeper pink, then layer the two pieces together with 3D foam pads. Create a 14.5cm square blank from pale green and use washi tape to embellish the edges. Fix the heart in the centre.

Resize the daisy design to create four sizes, one to 4cm, another to 3.5cm, and the last two to 3cm and 2.5cm wide. Position four of one size in each corner of the layout mat. Place different shades of pink card in the four corners of the cutting mat and cut out. Repeat with four different shades of pink card.

3 Cut several full size leaves from green card. Glue three or four different sized daisies together to make stacked flowers and curl up the petals. Arrange the flowers in clusters around the card placing leaves underneath each one. Fix a flat-backed pearl to the centre of each flower to complete.


the world around me - there's so much possibility and beauty if we're willing to expand our horizons."

Origami octopus

Follow expert 6 Mari Ono as she

ari Ono's new book Origami Ocean Friends takes inspiration from Blue Planet II and is brimming with ocean dwellers and seaside creatures. We're delighted folds and cuts to share the instructions to make a happy-go-lucky octopus, and the a tentacled process is actually very similar to a traditional origami crane – just remember to curl the tentacles once you've finished. Get your hands Sea creature on a copy of the title to enjoy the origami papers illustrated by Mari's husband, Takumasa, or simply use prints from your stash and draw on the details afterwards.



With the design face-down, fold the paper in half from corner to corner across the design to make a crease and open out. Fold between the other corners, then lift the left-hand corner, open out the flap, and press forward into a diamond. Turn the paper over and repeat



Lift the left-hand flap to the vertical, open the pocket, and press down to form a triangle



Turn the paper over and repeat. Repeat on the other two faces, turning the paper over each time



Fold up the lower diagonal edges of the uppermost flaps on both sides so that they meet along the central crease



Open up the flaps and push the middle of the horizontal edge up and away so that the edges of paper now meet each other along the central crease. Repeat three times around the model



Turn the left-hand flap to the right to reveal the design for the face



Fold in the lower edges so that they meet along the central crease. Repeat on the other three sides, turning the model over as needed



Fold up each point, making a horizontal crease as high up the model as possible, turning the paper over as necessary





Use scissors to carefully cut up the middle of each long flap to create eight tentacles. The model will naturally sit in this shape when all have been cut



Carefully pull open each face, ensuring that you don't open up the tentacles as you work. Finish by curling the tentacles around a pencil to give them some shape



CRAFT ENDLESS CARDS WITH THIS AMAZING OFFER



DEBOSSED DESIGN

1 Cut deep pink cardstock, 10.5cm x 15cm, and slip it inside the small fairy and frame embossing folder. Run it through a die-cutting machine and remove the card.

Plip it over so the image becomes debossed. Apply pigment chalks in pale pink and green shades to the surface of the card with a fingertip, sweeping gently so the chalk does not fall into the grooves created by the folder.

Trim the card parallel to the frame and cut around the overlapping parts. Mount the chalked panel onto a pale pink 10.5cm x 15cm blank, then add a sentiment panel in the top-right space.

COLOURFUL EMBOSSING

Trim a 10.5cm x 15cm piece of cream cardstock and insert it into the big fairy embossing folder. Run it through a die-cutting machine and remove the card from the folder.

Use a selection of high pigment coloured pencils to carefully fill in the areas within the embossed design. Make sure your pencil is sharp to ensure clean lines in the corners and colour in the same direction for a smoother finish.

Trim the card down to 10cm x 14cm and mount it onto a pale blue 10.5cm x 15cm blank.

Masterclass



Nifty die-cuts

Partial die cutting is a game-changer, and Tracey Daykin-Jones is here to reveal three top ways with the technique



You will need

- Craft essentials (see p94)
- Dies: ovals, circles, heart, clouds, trailing plant



Try stacking additional die-cuts on top of each other to add dimension



Score and fold down the centre of silver card, 12cm x 24cm, to create a square blank. Draw a vertical line down the centre of the front and tape a circle die to the centre. Sandwich the right half of the front between the cutting plates, lining up the edge of the plates along the vertical pencil line, and trim.

2 Score vertical lines above and below the semicircle, then fold the right half back on itself. Die cut a circle from blue card, followed by a smaller one from dark pink. Snip the pink circle in half and cut out three semicircles from the straight edge using a small circle die. Repeat with yellow card and trim the central panel using the original circle die.

3 Cut a rectangle from silver, round the bottom corners and die cut a small circle 3mm up from the bottom. Trim vertical lines from the circle and remove the excess card to create an umbrella handle. Adhere all the elements to the

Tie white ribbon into a bow and fix to the handle. Die cut clouds and adhere to the front and inside of the greeting, then stick mini silver gems below them to imitate rain. Print a sentiment, snip into a pennant shape, then fix bottom-right of the inside panel to finish.

SEAMLESS CUTTING

Take a panel of white and draw a horizontal line 3cm down from the top. Draw a second line 2.5cm below the first line and secure a trailing plant die to the card using low-tack tape. Place between the cutting plates, lining up the edge of the plates with the top pencil line so the majority of the card remains outside of the plates, and die cut.

2 Secure the die further down the card and sandwich between the plates, lining up the plate edges with the bottom pencil mark and leaving the top section of the card outside the plates. When both sections have been passed through a die-cutting machine, trim along the pencil lines, taking care not to cut through the die-cut shape.

Add to pink floral paper and layer onto a 10.5cm x 15cm blank matted with green polka dot paper and white card. Print out a sentiment, trim and secure to the white panel created earlier. Embellish with two silver gems to complete.

POP-UP MOTIF

Place 10.5cm x 15cm of blue card in a landscape position and draw a horizontal line across the centre. Draw a vertical line in the centre from the top to the horizontal line. Beneath the horizontal line, draw a vertical line at 3cm in from each edge.

Take a large circle die and secure on the bottom half of the card to create a bowl shape. Only place the area that needs cutting between the plates and pass through a die-cutting machine. Trim off the excess from around the base of the circle.

3 Using a large oval die, cut a curved shape from blue and a smaller curved shape from cream. Adhere them together and add to the top of the bowl shape. Trim a spoon handle from silver card and secure in place. Embellish the bowl with a pink heart.

Add striped paper to the remaining areas of the card. Print out a sentiment onto teal card and secure to the front using 3D foam pads to stabilise the design.







STEP-BY-STEP Ompossible card



Draw a horizontal line across the centre of blue card, then draw a vertical line in the centre from the top to the horizontal line. Beneath the horizontal line, draw a vertical line at 3cm in from each edge



Cut a curved shape from blue and a smaller curved shape from cream. Adhere together and add to the top of the bowl. Trim a spoon handle from silver card and secure in place



Die cut a circle from the bottom half of the card to create a bowl shape, only placing the area that needs cutting between the plates. Trim off the excess from around the base of the circle



Embellish the bowl with a pink heart. Add striped paper to the remaining areas of the card. Print out a sentiment and fix to the front using 3D foam pads to stabilise the design



TRACEY'S TOP TIPS

Part and

Your die-cutting machine can be used for more than simply trimming motifs. In fact, it feels like the possibilities are limitless thanks to partial die cutting, which is one of my favourite techniques. Here I show you how to create three different greetings. The z-fold card has a kinetic feel with a central motif that flips away. Be creative with basic shaped dies - the umbrella is actually created entirely out of circle dies, card and a ruler!

Nothing's impossible

I also demonstrate the impossible card, which is not impossible at all. Follow my step-by-step to create the greeting, which is sure to boggle the minds of your friends. If you've ever wanted to die cut a motif featuring a banner within it, you've come to the right place - my 'Feel better soon' creation is made all the more professional thanks to a seamless finish.

Remember: keep a note of these clever-fold techniques as a reminder when you need to impress loved ones!

WAYS WITH... Syletallics

Discover different foiling techniques to make your cards shine

You will need

- Craft essentials (see p94)
- > Cardstock, metallic
- Dies: circle, star
- Thermoweb Foil Mates: backgrounds, sentiments
- Thermoweb Deco: foil sheets, toner sheets
- Sentiments, rub-on stickers
- Motifs: birdcage, chipboard; leaf trim, metallic

HEAT IT UP!

1 Place pink foil upsidedown onto a 10cm square of spotted paper, tuck inside a folded sheet of thin paper and laminate. Allow the layers to cool, then peel off the foil backing to reveal the patterned design. Trim to 9.5cm square and mount onto a pink blank, 10cm square.

2 Create a pink foil sentiment on white card, 5cm x 7.5cm. Matt onto pink and lilac card, leaving a narrow border around each layer. Fix the panel to the card at an angle. Tie a bow from pink satin ribbon and glue to the top-left of the greeting.

othing shows you care more than a card with added shimmer! From heat transfer and reverse foiling to sprinkling metal foil flakes and simply matting metallic cardstock, there are a number of ways to achieve a shiny surface. Adding a foil effect not only creates an impressive look but a high quality finish, so follow Corinne Bradd's tutorial to achieve the look.




REVERSED IMAGE

Place green holographic foil over a leaf sheet, 9cm x 14cm, then laminate. Peel the backing away once cool. Next, matt onto light green card and fix onto a yellow top-folding blank, 10cm x 15cm.

Put the used backing over a toner sheet, 6cm x 10cm, and laminate to adhere the reversed image onto the panel. Peel off the backing, then matt the panel onto light green card.

Z Edge the top of the card with metallic leaf trim, secure the reversed panel onto the bottom-left with 3D foam pads and add another length of leaf trim. Fix a sentiment to the top-right of the reversed panel to finish.



TOP TIP

Take care when using foil card - grit from craft tools could scratch the surface and spoil your design

MAGICAL METALLICS

Layer geometric patterned paper onto a 10cm x 15cm light blue blank. Cut a circle, 9.5cm in diameter, from blue metallic card and fix to the centre.

Create concentric circles from the same blue and two other shades of metallic, then layer with 3D foam pads and fix to the centre of the largest circle. Z Die cut a sentiment into a circle and attach on top of the foil circles with 3D foam pads. Trim several

small stars from silver metallic card and scatter around the ring.

Two more CARDS to come,



DAZZLING DOILIES

Using a spatula, spread a thin uneven laver of texture paste onto a 15cm square of card and leave to dry. Paint with blue chalk paint. Once dry, gently sweep metallic gilding wax over the raised areas with your fingertip and buff the excess with a tissue. Trim to 12cm square. Glue sections of bronze and teal doilies to the panel, then mount onto a 13cm square turquoise blank. Rub a sentiment onto a 5cm square of pale blue cardstock, matt onto turquoise and add a doily top-right. Fix to the lower right of the card with 3D foam pads to finish.

Olse a craft knife to remove excess foil flakes around the edges

TWEET TWEET

1 Cover a 10cm x 15cm yellow blank with distressed patterned paper. Dab glue in the top-left and bottom-right corners, then sprinkle with metal foil flakes and pat with a paintbrush. Once dry, brush away the excess flakes.

Apply glue to a chipboard birdcage motif, sprinkle with foil flakes and tamp down, again brushing away any excess. Trace around the cage onto pink card and cut out. Glue to the back of the cage.

3 Round the corners of patterned paper, 6cm x 9cm, with a punch. Mount onto 8cm x 11cm of floral paper, also with rounded corners, then secure to the card. Fix the birdcage to the centre of the card and decorate with die-cut motifs.

WHELAN

I need a little inspiration to make a fun birthday card. Can you show me how?



KEREN BAKER SAYS: A playful character here, a splash of colour

there, this cheerful greeting is the perfect way to celebrate birthdays and more! For this ombré card, take three different sized square dies. Cut out two white squares and one vellow. Partial die cut 'Wish' from card, then score and fold over near the base of the letters. Stack and trim the squares to make a cake design. Punch green circles and adhere to the bottom layer. Stamp, trim and colour a cow and bunting, then fix to the cake using 3D foam pads. Add distress inks to the bottom and top of the letters. Secure sequins onto the punched circles to finish.

Keren Baker certainly knows how to make showstopper greetings and she's here to show you exactly how

When I press down my stamp, at times the lines around the motif prints onto the card. How can I improve my technique?



NANCY WATT SAYS: There are a few things you can do to avoid the risk of your

stamped motif from becoming ruined with unwanted ink marks. Be sure to check the sides of the stamp before you start and wipe away any excess ink if needed. I'd also recommend loading less ink onto the

stamp. If you're using a stamping block, make sure the edges of the clear stamp are fully stuck down. Lay the block flat and gently tap your ink onto the surface of the stamp instead of pushing it into the ink.

For more control, be sure to invest in the Rare Earth Load N Fold tool to ensure precise results.

How can I give my cards extra dimension?

COLETTE SMITH SAYS:



If you've never come across it before, 3D decoupage technique

where an image is built up in layers and is ideal for giving your greetings more depth. Certain parts of the image are raised, then attached to the lower layer with 3D foam pads. Here, I've illustrated a cute bee ready to dive into a glorious colourful spray of flowers. The design has five layers and is suitable for beginners; all you need is card, colouring mediums and adhesives. There is no right or wrong way to do decoupage, so just experiment, have fun and enjoy your new crafting technique!

What's the best way to clean my stamps?



ALISON WHELAN SAYS: For a auick clean inbetween applying various

colours, you can use something as simple as alcohol-free baby wipes. However, at the end of each stamping session it's important to remove as much of the remaining ink as possible to keep your

stamps in good condition and ready for the next time around. It can be tricky to reach awkward areas of the stamp, so I recommend spritzing them with a little of the Nuvo Stamp Cleaning Solution. Next, use the Nuvo Stamp Cleaning Pad to remove the ink from awkward grooves and intricate details for a thorough clean.



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Quick jargon buster

- **BRADS:** paper fasteners with split pins that pierce paper then pull apart to secure on the reverse
- **DECOUPAGE:** strips of paper are pasted to cover an object, or creating a 3D image by layering paper, where the smaller parts of a repeated image are cut out and added to the original image for a raised effect
- > DIE-CUTTING: a die-cutting machine cuts out shapes from paper, card and other materials. Sandwich a metal die over your material then feed it through the machine. The pressure on the die creates the cut
- MATTING: the method of layering different sizes of paper or card pieces together
- > ORIGAMI: the traditional Japanese art of folding paper to create 3D shapes
- > SANDING: using a sanding block to create a rough texture on the face or edges of a piece of card
- > SCORING: the method of running a scoring tool over a piece of card to create a straight line that can then be folded
