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

aperCrafter designers Sarah Jackman Read and Keren Baker are here to show you how to make the most of your PaperCrafter kit. It includes everything you need to learn how to create two shaker cards, but why stop there? Once you've mastered the skill you can use papers from your stash along with your circle template and snowman die to craft a whole batch of shaker and in time for the bird day.







How to use your free gift



Make a shaker

Crafting shaker greetings may look consuming, especially when glitter is involved. But we're on hand to share our go-to shaker card method. To start choose the background that you want to show through the shaker aperture, decorative card for the shaker frame front, then trace around the circle template in the centre and cut out with a craft knife – alternatively you could use a circle die. Adhere acetate to the reverse of the circle frame. Cut small squares from the 3D foam sheet, then adhere near the edge of the reverse of the acetate frame. This creates a raised area so that the shaker filling can move alitter onto the reverse of the acetate. then stick the card base onto the reverse to sandwich the contents of vour shaker.

Scene building

Build Yuletide scenes with your snowglobe shaker kit to celebrate the magic of Christmas. With 41 die-cut there's lots of fun to be had. From joyful sights of Santa delivering presents on Christmas Eve to silent nights where snow falls calmly over the village – there are lots of settings you can create. Have fun building scenes inside your shaker frames, on the card front, or even both. When you're making scenes be sure to

use the 3D foam pad that comes inside your kit, trimmed to the desired size. This will help you create dimension and bring depth to your designs.

Shake it!

filling. You can use the silver glitter snowflakes, stars and trees. Use various shades of card – or even metallic – to add interest to your designs. Experiment with different shaped and coloured sequins too - they'll catch the light beautifully and bring a touch of luxury to your finished projects.

Keren Baker says...

"To give the illusion of a snowglobe, encase a character inside the shaker frame and decorate the curve of the aperture with festive motifs"



You will need

- > Craft essentials (see p94)
- > Marker pens, coloured

Snow is falling

Create a greeting with a snow scene background, white blank and a blue snowflake frame, using the 'Make a shaker' instructions on page 13.

Adhere die-cut snowflakes across the greeting, decorating the centre of some of the motifs with silver glitter. Stick a 'Merry Christmas' sentiment die-cut at the base of the aperture.



TOP TIP

To create less static behind the shaker card, rub a tumble dryer sheet on the acetate before filling it with glitter

Snowglobe magic

Use the 'Make a shaker' instructions on page 13 to create a greeting with a snow scene background, grey blank and red spotty frame. 2 Fix a die-cut snowman, snowglobe base, present and a 'Merry Christmas' sentiment to the base of the aperture with 3D foam pads. Stick a 'With love' die-cut sentiment in the top-left, then decorate the greeting with

die-cut snowflakes.







Christmas Eve

Use the 'Make a shaker' instructions on page 13 to create a card with a village background, white blank and a blue snowflake frame.

Adhere a die-cut 'With love' sentiment in the top-right with 3D foam pads, then fix a die-cut robin to the left of it. Stick a red snowglobe base to the bottom of the aperture along with a Santa, robin and 'Merry Christmas' sentiment.

Festive post

Craft a greeting with the 'Make a shaker' technique on page 13. When constructing your card opt for a snowy scene background, a white blank and a red spotty frame.

Press out a die-cut robin on a branch, postbox, Scottie dog and a 'With love' sentiment. Arrange them to the right of the greeting, layering the Scottie dog with 3D foam pads.

Snowman tag

Cut a 7cm x 11cm tag from white card. Stick floral card to the top half of the tag, then layer snow trimmed from decorative-scene card to the bottom. Fix two house die-cuts to the top of the snow hills, then adhere a snowman and robin to the bottom-right.

Punch a hole in the top of the tag, thread with red baker's twine and tie into a bow. Decorate the snowman's buttons and snow hills with silver glitter.

Present tag

◆ Create a 6.5cm x 12.5cm tag shape from white card and mount blue snowflake card onto it. Stick a 1cm x 6.5cm strip of red spotty card near the bottom, then layer die-cut presents to the right with 3D foam pads.

Punch a hole in the top-centre of the tag, then thread with blue baker's twine and tie into a bow.



Look inside! Your kit includes everything you need to make shaker cards!



Die-cut details

create a greeting with a blue blank and snowy scene frame. For the background, decorate red spotty card with hill shapes trimmed from blue

O Die cut a snowman from white snowflake card and from red card, then trim the

Z Stick a few snowflake die-cuts across the background. Add glitter to greeting together, encasing snowglobe base and 'Merry Christmas' sentiment to the bottom of the aperture.

FOR MORE Die cutting TURN TO P37

Jolly holly 1 Create a greeting using the 'Make a shaker' instructions on page 13 with a blue blank and white snowflake frame. Stick a Santa die-cut to village scene card, then use this as the background.

Decorate the card front by fixing holly die-cuts to the base of the aperture. Adhere a red snowglobe base at the bottom with 3D foam pads, then a 'With love' sentiment to the right.

Sarah Jackman Read shows you how to create greetings with bags of character



ring joy and storytelling to your greetings by building scenes with Helz Cuppleditch's charming Christmas Village collection. With a decoupage pad, papers and, of course, a few jingle bells, vou'll be able to create delightful Yuletide settings. There are so many magical scenes you can create from a snowman family singing carols in the street, to penguins posting cards in the village, to reindeer dancing through the night sky with Santa and his sleigh. Have a go at Sarah's card projects to see how you can bring your scenes to life with stepper, gatefold and aperture cards too. Happy crafting!



You will need

- > Craft essentials (see p94)
- Template from paper craftermagazine.co.uk
- Paper collection, Helz Cuppleditch Christmas Village
- Embellishments: Helz Cuppleditch Christmas Village Glitter Stickers, Wreath Felt Toppers, Adhesive Pearls, Jingle Bells, Sentiment Toppers, Decoupage Pad, Mini Envelopes
- Stamps and dies, Helz Cuppleditch Christmas Village
- Die, oval
- Acetate

Double aperture

Fix a 13cm square of wreath paper to red spotty paper, leaving a narrow border, then stick to a 14cm square blank. Die cut a 10.5cm oval through the front of the card towards the top, then attach acetate behind the aperture.

2 Layer carol singing characters to the front-left of the aperture

along with some snowflake stickers. Fix snowmen and snowflakes to the back of the aperture. Take a 12cm square of teal snowflake paper and die cut a 7.5cm oval through it.

Attach the oval aperture behind the acetate with 3D foam pads. Fix a snowflake sticker to the centre of a piece of acetate, then adhere to the back of the snowflake panel. Adhere red

diamond paper to the inside of the greeting.

Stick a 2.5cm x 14cm strip of spotty paper near the base of the card, then a thin strip of teal snowflake paper on top. Adhere a red striped envelope to the bottom-left, tuck a sentiment inside it, then embellish the card front with red pearls.

Easel card

Take an 11cm x 15cm top-folding cream blank, then score and mountain fold the front to create an easel card. Take 6.5cm x 10cm of teal snowflake paper and layer onto fairy lights paper, leaving a narrow border. Attach this to the front panel. Stick 10.5cm x 14.5cm of

fairy lights paper to the base, then 6.5cm x 10cm of teal snowflake paper on top. Adhere 2.5cm x 10cm of red diamond paper on top and add a sentiment in the centre.

Fix a blue pearl in the corner of each panel. Layer a decoupage scene with reindeers in a window with 3D foam pads, then attach to the front panel so it protrudes from the top.



Layer 11.5cm x 16.5cm of envelope paper onto 12.5cm x 17.5cm of navy snowflake paper, then attach to a 13cm x 18cm top-folding white blank. Die cut a 15.5cm oval from the card front.



Take 10cm x 15cm of red diamond paper and die cut a 12.5cm oval from it, then attach behind the first aperture with 3D foam pads.Cut out a village scene and garland from the paper pad, then adhere behind the aperture.

Stick 12.5cm x 17.5cm of 🜙 navy snowflake paper inside the greeting. Fix a decoupage of penguins posting mail to the right of the aperture. Layer together strips of navy and red

decorative papers and stick below the aperture.

Attach a sentiment to the left of the greeting, then blue pearls either side. String five gold jingle bells onto jute thread and fix along the top of the card, securing on the reverse.



TOP TIP

Multiple apertures create the illusion of depth and will help bring your scenes to life

Five more to come

Easy stepper

Take 12cm x 25cm of red card, then score and fold the long side in half to create a top-folding blank. Score down the short side of red card, 11.5cm x 12cm, at 5cm, then 10cm. Attach double-sided tape to the flap and adhere to the card front.

Mountain fold the panel to create a stepper card. Layer 10.5cm x 11cm of navy snowflake paper onto teal, then attach to the back panel. Fix 4.5cm x 11.5cm of teal snowflake paper to the front panels.

3 Add a thin strip of navy snowflake paper to the bottom of the front stepper. Decorate the back panel with a sticker of Santa and his reindeer, a Christmas village trimmed from the paper pad and a sentiment topper.

Layer a decoupage scene to the front of the card with 3D foam pads. Adorn the corners of the greeting with red pearls. Wrap red baker's twine around the greeting base and tie into a bow with a jingle bell.





Gatefold greeting

Cut pink card, 15cm x 28cm, then score down the long side at 7cm and 21cm. Fold the score lines inwards to create a gatefold blank. Adhere 13.5cm x 14.5cm of teal snowflake paper inside.

Trim two pieces of sentiment paper, 6cm x 14cm, then layer onto navy snowflake paper, leaving a narrow border. Stick these to the front panels. Take two strips of 2cm x 7cm navy snowflake paper, layer onto pink card, then adhere to the centre of the front sections.

Z Layer a window decoupage scene with 3D foam pads and adhere to the left of the greeting. Stamp a sentiment onto pink card with blue ink, trim, then layer onto teal snowflake paper. Fix this to the top-right corner of the decoupage. Decorate the greeting with red pearls.



Thave fun with themes

Mini windows

◆ Create an 8cm x 15cm top-folding white blank, then layer 7.5cm x 14.5cm of striped paper to the front. Adhere 4cm x 14cm of envelope paper towards the top. Die cut three 2.5cm squares from the bottom of the card, then fix acetate behind each one.

Secure a heart sticker to the centre of each aperture. Stick a 1cm x 14.5cm strip of navy snowflake paper above the apertures, then add three large blue pearls in the centre. Adhere three mini envelopes at an angle to the top of the greeting with 3D foam pads.

Z Attach a robin topper in the middle envelope, then a snowflake and polar bear in the other ones. Stamp two sentiments onto white card, die cut, then fix to the hands of the characters.



Something new

Take a 14cm square of white card and mark along the centre with a pencil. On the section above the pencil mark, cut a line down the centre to the pencil mark. On the bottom section cut a line 3cm in from the left, then repeat on the other side.

Turn the right side of the card over, then push up the centre panel to create a blank. Layer a scene with characters singing carols, fix to the upright panel, then embellish with blue pearls. Layer spotty paper, then sentiment paper onto the base of the greeting.

Stick a 2.5cm x 14cm strip of navy snowflake paper onto white card, then adhere to the base of the greeting. Fix a sentiment to the right of the strip with 3D foam pads, then a large blue pearl either side.



Wreath decoration

Layer 9.5cm x 13.5cm of character paper onto teal snowflake paper, then fix to a 10.5cm x 15cm cream blank. Trim teal snowflake paper, 3.5cm x 12.5cm, into a pennant, then adhere to the centre of the greeting.

Take 5cm x 12.5cm of diamond paper, layer onto teal snowflake paper, then trim the bottom into a pennant. Add a sentiment sticker to the bottom of the pennant. Adhere a felt wreath to the top of the greeting.

Wrap green baker's twine from the top of the wreath, over the card, then adhere in place with a jingle bell. Add red pearls to the wreath and blue pearls to the corners of the card.

Step

Make a jolly greeting that's as cute as a button

f there's any character that's synonymous with Christmas it has to be the one and only Santa Claus. Tracey Daykin-Jones shows you how to bring the magic of the festive season alive with this cheerful budget-friendly card. All you need is card scraps, basic dies and a button.

You will need

- Craft essentials (see p94)
- Dies: circles, scallopedged circles, paisley
- > Sequins: silver, white
- > Button, red
- Acetate

Step One

Die cut two large scallopedged circles from white card, then fix a light pink circle to one. Die cut a large circle from red, trim a triangular shape from the left, then cut the bottom section off.

Step Two

Attach to the pink circle and add a curved white strip over the join. Stick white circles to the front and back of the hat's pointy edge to create a pom-pom. Adhere two paisley shapes to the bottom of the pink circle to create a moustache.

Step Three

Add gems and a button to complete the face. Secure the remaining scallop-edged circle to the back, glueing the top edge only.



Do you find yourself reaching for the same coloured paper, sentiments and embellishments year after year? If so we're on hand to help you see your festive craft stash in a new light and share our top tips on how to create fun, tailored greetings for your loved ones.

From where to start, what elements you can change up, and how to add a modern twist, we cover it all. Most importantly, discover how you can create cards that are personal and will make your recipient smile. Because, after all, that's what the spirit of Christmas is about.



Colour kudos

Traditionally we tend to associate red, green and gold with Christmas. But why not mix things up? Pastel tones, fiesta brights and even rich peacock shades such as teal are popular palettes. But how do you make this work for Christmas? The key is to combine your chosen palette of colours with a metallic accent or glitter. This paired with Yuletide motifs and embellishments will give your card that all-important festive factor.

Mix it up

Surprise your recipient with a playful twist! Have fun with shaped, pop-up, shaker and kinetic greetings. Make your own shaped cards by die cutting or placing a template onto

> a blank, then trimming around it, making sure part of the fold stays intact.

lots of tips on how to use it over on page 13. When designing greetings keep your recipient in mind. Are you creating for a friend or a little one? Think of what they enjoy about Christmas and what will make them smile. If you're looking for a playful greeting for the whole family, turn to page 90 and follow our step-by-step to create a Santa spinner card – it's great fun to make and even doubles up as a festive party game.



Get sentimental

What do you want your creation to say? Instead of conforming to traditional sentiments why not try adding personal accents? Use family names, the year, a child's name, or mark milestones such as a baby's first Christmas. Add a special touch to your chosen message and make your sentiment sing by die cutting it from glitter card, embossing, or foiling it. If the sentiment is the focus of your greeting you may want to position it in the centre and make it the star of the show. You can even protrude it from the top of the card with acetate, or stamp it onto a tag to frame it. Or perhaps you have lots of motifs and patterns so want to fix your message discreetly in the bottom corner? If you're batch making be sure to plan your sentiments before so that you can leave adequate space, then go back and personalise each greeting.

- ★ GLITTER: encase it in a shaker frame, scatter it over vour greetings, or delicately emboss it onto sentiments – the choice is yours!
- ★ POM-POMS: thread coloured ones onto a length of thread to create a mini garland, or fix them to the base of your greeting to mimic snowballs
- ★ | INGLE BELLS: is there a more iconic Christmas sound? Thread bells onto baker's twine and adhere them to your designs for a special festive jingle

WAYS WITH... Washi tape

Corinne Bradd uses on-trend tapes to make Christmas crafts that are ship-shape





Washi tape is one of the most popular trends in the craft world right

now. That's not surprising considering its versatility. You can use it to customise photo frames, for scrapbooking, and even to make Christmas decorations which is what Corinne Bradd is here to demonstrate. It's so simple to use and adds that trendy splash of colour and pattern that every project needs.

You will need

- Craft essentials (see p94)
- Washi tape
- Dies, circles
- › Acrylic paint, white
- > Embroidery thread



Tapin' trees

1 Create a 10cm x 15cm blank. Decorate the edge of the card with strips of berry print washi tape, mitring the corners to neaten them. Add another border of narrower plain tape inside the first.

Cut an 11cm long thin triangle from green card and cover with horizontal strips of foliage print washi, folding the ends to the back. Fix to the centre of the card with 3D foam pads and add a gold card star to the top.

Starry night
Trim three small squares

of card and cover them all with a patterned washi tape trimmed to the edges. Cut each covered square in half diagonally to make six triangles. 2 Stack three triangles together at different angles to create a five-pointed star and glue in place. Repeat with the remaining pieces of card.

Make several more stars using different sized triangles and tapes. Punch a small hole in the side points of each shape and thread onto baker's twine to create a length of bunting.

TOP TIP

Make sure you brush off any glue tack as this can prevent the washi tape from sticking properly

Bespoke baubles

Use a 7.5cm diameter circle die to cut several shapes from scrap cardboard. Glue the discs together in stacks of three or four to create thick tags and paint them white.

When dry, cover the front of each bauble with lengths of washi tape, adding strips of a narrower contrasting design if desired. Trim the tape to the edges of the circle with sharp scissors.

Cut a Christmas tree shape from gold card and fix to the centre of one bauble with 3D foam pads. Punch a small hole in the top of each disc and thread with baker's twine for hanging.



Layered wreath

Snip 2cm long pieces of washi tape and fold the top corners of each piece to the back to make a triangle with a sticky strip along the bottom. Cut a 6cm diameter circle from card and fix eight of the triangles around the edge.

Make eight more triangles from a different patterned tape and fix these inside the first ring so the points sit in the gaps. Make a third ring in the same way to build up the wreath. Cover a 5cm disc of card with tape and place this over the centre of the wreath to hide the raw edges.

Mount on a larger circle of red card and add a die-cut sentiment in the centre. Edge a small square blank with tartan washi and fix the layered wreath to the centre with 3D foam pads.





Gift wrapped

Cover a 10cm x 15cm landscape blank with yellow spotty paper and fix a strip of present patterned washi along the bottom edge.

Cut several small squares and rectangles of white card and cover them with different patterned washi tapes, folding the ends to the reverse.

Wrap each piece of covered card with red embroidery thread, tying the ends into a neat knot on the front and trimming to about 1cm. Arrange the presents on the card using 3D foam pads, allowing them to overlap.

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Ewe've been framed

Claire Richards shows you how to turn the attention to your stamped images with die-cut frames



You will need

- > Craft essentials (see p94)
- Paper collection, First Edition Christmas Wishes
- Dies: My Favorite Things Die-Namics Merry Christmas Circle Frame, Stitched Rounded Rectangle, Pinking Edge Rectangle, Stitched Cover Up Companion; Pretty Pink Posh Stitched Film Strip; Concord & 9th Confetti Card; Lawn Fawn Baaah Humbug
- Stamps, Lawn Fawn Baaah Humbug
- Stencil, Newton's Nook Holiday Foliage
- Ink pads, Tim Holtz
 Distress Oxide Cracked
 Pistachio, Twisted Citron,
 Lucky Clover, Worn
 Lipstick
- Alcohol markers
- Glossy accents, Ranger Clear
- > Beads, clear dome

mask, apply Cracked
Pistachio Distress Oxide ink
onto the white card,
blending outwards.

3 Stamp a sheep, present, hat and bow onto white card, then colour with markers. Die cut with their coordinating dies. Adhere the sheep to the centre of the card, then attach the two circle frames on top. Fix the hat and present in place.

Fix two short pieces of ribbon to the bottom edge of the frame, then stick the bow on top. Apply glossy accents to the bow, then adhere six clear dome beads.

Window frames

Take an 11cm x 14cm white blank and fix 10.5cm x 13.5cm of gold card to the front. Die cut the Stitched Cover Up Companion from white card. Put the inner rectangles to one side.

On the narrow rectangle blend Warm Lipstick

Distress Oxide ink, then splatter with water droplets. Stamp three leaves in green ink onto the panel. On the wider rectangle blend Twisted Citron Distress Oxide, then Lucky Clover on top through a Holiday Foliage stencil.

Once dry stick both of the panels behind the corresponding apertures. Adhere the finished panel to the greeting with 3D foam pads. Stamp two sheep and a bow onto white card and colour with markers.

Stamp holly and berries in green and red ink onto one of the sheep, then adhere the bow to the other sheep. Trim the edges of the sheep, then adhere them in the right frame. Apply glossy accents to the bow and holly berries.

5 With green ink stamp 'Warm winter wishes' onto white card, then die cut into two stitched rectangles. Adhere to the centre of the greeting at an angle, then decorate with gold sequins.

TOP TIP

Flip your frame – a die that is designed horizontally could give you more options

Baaahrilliant apertures

Take a 10.5cm x 13.5cm side-folding blank, then stick 10cm x 13cm of red tartan paper to the front. Die cut an 8.5cm x 12cm Stitched Rounded Rectangle from white card.

2 Stamp fairy lights onto each corner of the rectangle, then colour with markers. Fix the coloured panel to the card front, then add glossy accents to the lights. Adhere 4.5cm x 12.5cm of green patterned paper to the centre of the card.

With black ink stamp 'All I want for Christmas is ewe' above and below the paper. Die cut a Film Strip from white card. Stamp three sheep, a scarf, knitting needles and a bow onto white card, then colour with markers.

Stick a sheep in each aperture, then trim away any excess. Adhere the frame to the green area on the greeting with 3D foam pads. Add the scarf, knitting needles and bow to the sheep.



Circle sentiment

1 Create an 11cm x 14cm top-folding blank and fix red patterned paper to the front. Die cut a Merry Christmas Circle Frame from both white card and red patterned paper. Retain one of the circles cut from the centre, then set aside.

Die cut a Pinked Edge Rectangle from white card. Using the circle from the centre of the die-cut as a

Die cut a Film Strip frame from white card, then trim a slightly larger piece of green patterned paper



Place the images in the frame and cut off any excess, then adhere in place



Stamp your chosen images onto white card with black ink, then colour with markers

CLAIRE'S TOP TIPS

Frame it

Stamps and frame dies are a really fun and eye-catching combination as they provide a great focus to your stamped images. Some frame dies are sized to cover up your entire card front, whilst others are handy smaller frames, but all will give you endless possibilities for your card designs. Starting a greeting with a frame die gives you instant inspiration as you stamp and colour your images to fit.

Craft creatively

The versatility of frame dies makes them a worthwhile craft investment. Play around and have fun creating different effects. You can even die cut several frames, then layer them together to create dimension. Be adventurous with colour and frame your frames. Yes, that's right - border them with vibrant shades of paper to really make your design pop. It's easy to add stamped images within your frames too. I used Lawn Fawn's Baaah Humbug collection to create funny festive greetings.

PROMOTION BY brother Build a wreath

Dress your door with festive foliage by crafting a decoration with Brother's ScanNCut machine

ith just four digital cutting files, Corinne Bradd shows you how to design and create your very own Christmas wreath. Simply cut the foliage shapes as many times as you like from vibrant green, pink and red card, then get building. With your cutting files you'll achieve pristine curved stems and perfectly formed flowers, resulting in a stunning centrepiece for your table, or an inviting decoration for your door. Add an extra flourish of Christmas cheer by sprinkling your creation with glitter, or embossing card to create unique leafy textures.

You will need

- Craft essentials (see p94)
- > Templates from paper craftermagazine.co.uk
- > Brother ScanNCut CM900 machine

Christmas wreath

Make a base for the wreath by setting a 20cm wide circle on the layout screen of your Brother ScanNCut machine. Place a 14cm wide circle in the centre of this, then set the machine to cut out the concentric circles from red card to create a ring.

Using the templates from our website, cut four light and dark green card.

Stick them to the ring by the stems, alternating the colours. Cut several berry sprigs from red card and add them to the arrangement, tucking the ends of the stems under the foliage.

Cut lots of flowers from bright pink card, then curl the petals with the blade on a pair of scissors. Adhere the flowers to the wreath randomly. If you're planning to hang the finished decoration, stick a loop of baker's twine on the



How to use your machine

1 Templates at the ready Download and print the templates from our website, then scan them into the machine's memory.

2 Go digital Alternatively you can download the templates as SVG files, transfer them onto a memory stick, then plug this into your machine.

3 Test cut Check your blade is sharp and free from paper fibres and perform a test cut on the same weight cardstock before you start your project.

4 You're ready to start Remember to secure your card to the sticky mat properly before starting, as intricate cutting patterns will cause the blade to change direction suddenly and this may cause the card to shift if the mat has lost its tack.

Arm yourself with various sized circle dies and some acetate before starting these aperture-happy projects - enjoy!



You will need

- > Craft essentials (see p94)
- > FREE PaperCrafter patterned papers (see p49)
- Glitter paper
- Acetate
- Glitter, iridescent
- Buttons, white
- Dies, various circles
- > Punch, small hole

Circle apertures

Create a 12cm x 17cm side-opening white blank, then cover the front with yellow paper, 11.5cm x 16.5cm. Matt our pretzel paper, 10.5cm x 15.5cm, onto white glitter paper, then adhere on top.

2 Secure a 2.5cm strip of snowflake paper across the centre of the card front. Die cut three 4cm diameter circles down the right side. Wrap baker's twine twice either side of the central aperture.

Attach our mulled wine paper behind each aperture with 3D foam pads, ensuring three full motifs show through. Fix our 'Eat drink and be merry' sentiment on the left with 3D foam pads, then thread pink baker's twine through a button, tie into a bow and adhere next to it.





Snowy scene

Make a 13cm x 18cm top-folding white blank. Adhere slightly smaller green paper to the front. Layer our fairy lights paper, 11.5cm x 16.5cm, onto white glitter paper, then stick on top. Fix house paper, 5.5 cm x16cm, towards the bottom and die cut an 8cm diameter circle through the front on the right side.

Wrap two lengths of pink baker's twine either side of the aperture. Trim white glitter paper to create snowy peaks, then use 3D foam pads to attach behind the aperture,

along with snowflake paper. Cut out three trees from our print and secure within the snowy peaks with 3D foam pads. Adhere 'Happy Christmas' matted onto glitter paper in the top-left corner. Thread pink baker's twine through a button, tie in a bow, then fix to the left of the aperture.

Easel greeting

Die cut two 13.5cm diameter circles from white card, then attach slightly smaller peach circles on top. Die cut two 11.5cm diameter circles in our wooden tov paper, layer onto pink circles, then adhere on top.

Take one circle and die cut an 8cm diameter circle through the centre. Wrap pink baker's twine twice either side of the aperture. Fix snowy peaks and three Christmas market stalls behind the aperture.

Z Die cut a 13.5cm circle from our tree paper, then adhere behind the aperture with 3D foam pads. Thread pink baker's twine through a button, tie in a bow and secure to the right of it.

From Christmas market paper, die cut a 10cm diameter circle. Trim a third off, then stick to the other circle. Attach our 'Christmas wishes' sentiment with 3D foam pads. Trim white card, 4cm x 28cm, secure to the back of both circles and fold to create an easel card.

Glitter showcase

Create a 13cm x 18cm topfolding white blank and cover the front with slightly smaller orange paper. Layer our tree paper, 11.5cm x 16.5cm, onto white glitter paper and adhere on top.

Die cut a 9.5cm diameter circle through the card front towards the top, then secure acetate behind the aperture. Run 3D foam pads around the back of the aperture.

Trim snowflake paper, 11cm square, then cut out a row of houses and stick across the centre of the aperture. Sprinkle white iridescent glitter on the acetate, peel off the backing from the 3D foam pads, then attach the snowflake paper face-down on top.

Adhere our stalls print, 4cm x 13cm, beneath the aperture. Wrap blue baker's twine twice across it, then fix one of our sentiments in the centre with 3D foam pads. Thread blue baker's twine through a button, tie into a bow and stick to the right.

TOP TIP

Use white iridescent glitter to best mimic snow within your aperture

Mini aperture

Cut white card, 8cm x 17cm, then snip off the top corners diagonally to create a tag. Trim our mulled wine paper slightly smaller than the tag, layer onto yellow paper, then adhere on top.



Die cut a 6cm diameter circle from white glitter paper, then cut a 4cm diameter circle through it. Attach a cut-out tree and snowflake paper in the aperture with 3D foam pads and stick to the centre of the tag.

Adhere a 3.5cm x 8cm strip of Christmas market paper across the bottom of the tag. Punch a hole through the top and thread blue baker's twine through it.


Layer our sentiment tag onto white glitter paper and punch a hole through the top. Thread with baker's twine and secure with 3D foam pads. Thread baker's twine through a button, tie into a bow and adhere to the top to finish.

Rethink your ink

Learn three clever techniques with Laura Bradley: faux watercolour, emboss resisting and bleach effects



You will need

- Craft essentials (see p94)
- Stamps: My Favorite Things Polar Pals, Lawn Fawn Winter Big Scripty Words
- Dies: My Favorite Things Polar Pals, Icebergs;
 W Plus 9 Landscape Borders
- Ink pads: Ranger Distress Oxide Salty Ocean, Peacock Feathers, Tumbled Glass, Blueprint Sketch; Memento Tuxedo Black; VersaFine Onyx Black; VersaMark
- Embossing powder, white
- > Glitter, clear
- Acetate
- Tools: blending, heat, anti-static
- Water spritzer
- Glue, Cosmic Shimmer



Watercolour wash

1 Create an 11.5cm x 14.5cm side-folding white blank.
Trim a rectangle of white cardstock slightly smaller than the card front and make a background following our step-by-step opposite. Attach the background panel to the centre of the blank with double-sided tape.

2 Stamp polar bears and a fish bucket onto white cardstock using Memento ink and colour in with alcohol markers. Cut the images using



the coordinating dies and add to the card with wet glue. Stamp an 'Oh joy' sentiment with VersaFine ink, then apply a shadow with a white gel pen.

Emboss resist

Make a 12.5cm square white blank. Cut a square of white cardstock slightly smaller. Treat the top section of the panel with an anti-static tool and stamp a 'Let it snow' sentiment with VersaMark ink. Sprinkle over white embossing powder and set with a heat tool.

Blend Tumbled Glass
Distress Oxide ink over
the entire embossed piece
with a blending tool. The
embossed sentiment will
resist the ink and push
through. Add Peacock
Feathers ink around the
edges. Attach the panel to the
centre of the greeting.

Die cut a landscape border from white cardstock, the same width as the embossed piece, and attach to the bottom of the scene with double-sided tape. Die cut two icebergs from white cardstock, adding

accents with light blue markers. Adhere the icebergs behind the landscape.

Stamp polar bears onto white cardstock and colour in, then die cut. Add to the card front with wet glue. Finish by creating snow with a white gel pen.

Bleach effect

Create a 10cm x 12.5cm top-folding white blank, then cut a rectangle of white cardstock measuring slightly less. Blend Salty Ocean Distress Oxide ink all over the smaller piece with a blending tool, then add Blueprint Sketch ink around the edges.

2 Spritz the background with water and press a clean paper towel over the top. Lift it up to reveal a bleached effect that mimics snow. Dry off with a heat tool, then add the background to the centre of the greeting with double-sided tape.

Cut a curved section from white cardstock using a landscape border die. Adhere to the bottom of the scene. Stamp 'Be merry' with VersaFine black ink and add a shadow with a Quickie glue

pen, before sprinkling with glitter. Tap off the excess. Stamp a polar bear onto white cardstock and colour in. Trim using the coordinating die, then add to the card.

TOP TIP

Make sure the paper towel you use for the bleaching technique is clean, to avoid any transfer of other colours onto your project





STEP-BY-STEP Onk, spritz, repeat



Dab Salty Ocean Distress Oxide ink onto a small piece of acetate and spritz with water



Dry the ink using a heat tool



Transfer the ink from the acetate to cardstock. Repeat until the desired effect is achieved



Repeat steps 1-3 with Peacock Feathers ink to complete the background



LAURA'S TOP TIPS

Loosen up

The best bit of advice I can give you is to play around and have fun. Trying the watercolour technique? Don't worry if yours doesn't look like mine – the joy of this is that every time you'll get a different finish, so your cards will always be unique. The same goes for the other two methods. The emboss resist how-to will always work, no matter how dark the colour of Distress Oxide ink is. These processes are always so quick, that if you're not happy with the finished look, why not try again? The first attempt may look better on another card design.

Always on hand

Paper towels are your friends. To make embossed sections pop more, wipe them over with one afterwards to clean up any excess ink. You'll also need a paper towel for the bleaching technique - in fact, it's essential. Just make sure it's clean, otherwise you'll ruin your work so far... and you wouldn't want that!

Robins & ribbons

Create a top-folding 14cm square blank. Trim robin paper, 12.5cm square, mount onto kraft card, then onto red. Snip a pine cone border sticker to measure 12.5cm long and attach to the bottom of the card. Cut a strip of red striped paper to 3.5cm x 12.5cm and mount onto kraft card.

Attach ribbons onto this piece and glue the strip onto the card. Tie a bow with the ribbon, then glue a

rhinestone to the centre and stick in place. Cut out holly from the background paper and attach with 3D foam pads.

3 Adhere three word stickers onto the card with 3D foam pads. Add three self-adhesive pearls to the top-left corner to finish.

Stamping savvy

Make a 16cm square top-folding blank. Trim floral paper, 15cm square,

and stamp small leaves all over using pale green ink. Mount onto kraft card, then glue onto the front of the greeting. Cover a 15cm strip of card with striped washi tape and glue onto the greeting, then snip a green leaf border strip and stick above.

Q Glue a red paper doily to the right of the card, then cut a 'Merry and bright' wreath using a stitched circle die and attach to the doily with 3D foam pads. Cut out a poinsettia from the paper and add glitter onto

the petals. Adhere the poinsettia in place with 3D foam pads and add a rhinestone to the centre, then glue two wooden poinsettias each side.

Cut a strip of ginghan

Cut a strip of gingham ribbon into a fishtail shape and attach to the top-left corner. Tie a bow using the same ribbon, add a rhinestone to the centre and glue to the gingham strip. Fix three red pearls bottom-right.



Two more CARDS to come



Sticker tips

Make a white 13cm x 20cm top-folding blank. Adhere 12cm x 19cm of floral paper to red card, then stick to the card front. Snip green paper, 10cm x 17cm, matt onto red card and glue to the greeting. Trim a leaf border to measure 19.5cm, then fix towards the bottom.

Attach a large floral arrangement sticker onto the card using 3D foam pads. Apply glue on the petals and sprinkle glitter over the top. Tap off the excess and allow to dry.

3 Attach a small red bird sticker onto the flowers using 3D foam pads Stick two sentiment stickers in place with 3D foam pads and add a self-adhesive pearl to each corner.

TOP TIP

For a more sparkly look, try adding glitter around the edges of your papers and toppers



Festive wreath

Take a top-folding blank, 16cm square, then glue slightly smaller red card to it. Snip wooden effect paper, 14cm square, then mount onto white card and add to the blank.

Attach the leaf border washi tape onto white card, then trim to measure 15.5cm long and matt in place. Cut out a floral wreath from background paper, then

adhere a piece of green background paper behind the centre of the wreath with 3D foam pads. Fix the wreath in place with 3D foam pads.

Cut out a bird and stick to the left of the wreath.

Attach a sentiment sticker in place with 3D foam pads, then glue the wooden joy embellishment to the bottomright corner of the card. Add red self-adhesive gems to the top corners to finish.

Create your scenes

it in, then matt onto coordinating patterned paper, and you're done! Elsewhere, our cardmaker Kitty Frampton has coloured in various houses, cut them out and rearranged them to create alternative street scenes.

ake some time away from the hustle and bustle of Christmas preparations to create a stunning 3D papercut scene.

Whether you choose to therapeutically make yours the traditional way with a craft knife or let your digital die-cutting machine do the work, you'll be left with a mesmerising decoration. Corinne Bradd shows you how to encase your papercut in a glass dome with fairy lights for a warming evening light, or an impressive table centrepiece. Personalise your design by using different coloured card, embossing paper and building it with more layers.

Die-cut scene Download the templates

Download the templates from our website and trace them onto coloured card. Cut out the scene, starting with the smallest pieces first to keep the sheet as stable as possible. Alternatively, you can download digital versions of the cutting files from our website and cut the templates with a digital die-cutting machine.

Take 21cm x 30cm of card and roll into a large tube, ensuring the edges overlap by at least 2cm, then secure with double-sided tape. Wrap a sheet of vellum loosely around the tube and secure with double-sided tape, making sure it doesn't stick to the card underneath.

Take the papercut branches and fix one side of it to the join on the vellum. Allow it to curve around the vellum without touching it and fix the other side to the join. This will become the back of the lamp.

Fix the trees, deer and foliage around this, adding additional card tabs to the sides to allow each layer to sit loosely around the last. Cut a small notch in the bottom-back of the arrangement, then place battery-operated fairy lights inside the tube from the bottom up.

5 Place the arrangement to the wooden base of the dome with clear tape, then carefully slide the card tube up and out from the centre without moving the lights. Turn the lights on and position the glass dome over the top of the papercut display.

STEP-BY-STEP

Snowy tri-fold

Create a fun concertina card with Colette Smith in nine simple steps

dd a twist to your Christmas cardmaking by mixing up the shape of your greetings. For something cute, quirky and fun to make, why not give these tri-fold snowmen a try? Colette Smith shares her steps to creating these effective cards, which you can of course customise for your recipients.



Download the snowman templates from our website and print onto thin card or thick paper, then cut out



Cut white card, 13cm x 24cm. With the card portrait, score across at 8cm and 16cm, then fold to make a tri-fold blank



Place the template over the blank so it overlaps the edges slightly. Draw around it, cut out, then erase any pencil marks. Ink the edges



Cut three pairs of arms from brown card and scarves from aqua, green and red card. Snip three small triangles from orange card for the noses



Fix a pair of arms to the back of each snowman so they are in line with the top of their heads



Take brown card, 2cm x 25cm, then stamp a festive phrase onto it with white ink



Snip a fishtail into each end of the sentiment strip, then distress the edges with brown ink



Add thin strips of black card to each snowman's hand, then fix the sentiment on top. Score the banner to match the fold lines of the greeting



Add a scarf, nose and black card circles for buttons to each snowman. Draw the facial features with a black fineliner

- Ink pads: Versafine Vintage Sepia; white
- > Fineliner, black
- Gel pen, white
- > Punch, hole

Stamp, colour and die cut furry friends to create endearing greetings



ho wouldn't want to receive a card with an ice-skating penguin, dogs in Santa hats, or bears decorating a Christmas tree? You're bound to have fun crafting greetings with festive characters – simply take your pick from these adorable projects. From beginner techniques like stamping and colouring to more advanced pop-up designs, we've got something for you all to try.

1. Stamped characters

Maker: COLETTE SMITH

Create a punny greeting with decorative paper scraps, a festive stamp set and some coloured markers. To start cover a 10.5cm x 15cm white blank with tree patterned paper. Cut a wavy line across grid paper 4cm deep, then attach along the bottom. Stamp a moose, colour and cut out. Add googly eyes and fix to the bottom-left of the greeting. Stamp a sentiment onto white card, then trim into a fishtail banner. Matt the sentiment onto kraft card and trim, leaving a narrow border. Attach to the top-right of the card. Thread a button with twine and white thread, tie in a bow and glue to the banner.

2. Easy pop-up

Maker: CATHIE SHUTTLEWORTH

This cheerful reindeer is bound to brighten someone's Christmas. Create a tall side-opening card. Download the reindeer head template from our website, then trace onto coloured paper. Score along the dotted line and fold the head over. Decorate behind the head with strips of paper and add a sentiment. Attach the head to the front of the blank. With circle punches, cut out eyes, a nose and bauble decorations. Fix the features to the head and draw a mouth and detail on the ears. Add ornate antlers with a black pen and decorate with circles and white 3D paint.







3. Pet pals

Maker: KITTY FRAMPTON

Create this adorable greeting for the pet lover in your life. Cover a 13cm square blank with red card, then fix holly patterned paper to the front. Die cut a stitched square from white card, mount onto red and stick in place. Draw two 1.5cm lines at the top of the white panel. Cut striped paper, 2.5cm x 12.5cm, then layer onto red card and glue across the front. Stamp two dogs, a tree, present and two baubles with black ink onto white card. Colour the images with marker pens. Die cut using the coordinating dies and attach in place with 3D foam pads. Stamp a sentiment onto white card and fix at the top. Add glossy accents to the baubles and lights, then leave to dry. Decorate the star with glitter to finish.

4. Rockin' robin

Maker: **ELIZABETH MOAD**

Grab your paper scraps and get crafting this speedy festive greeting. Cut a bird body from turquoise card, a breast from pink spotty paper, then a wing from green patterned paper. Layer together and add dashed lines and an eye in black pen, then mount onto a 10cm circle of cream card. Draw legs in brown pen, add a beak from yellow card and gather three small leaf-shaped pieces for a tail. Trim a Christmas hat and thin band, matt onto the top of the bird and glue a white pom-pom to the tip. Fix the cream circle to the top corner of an 11cm square spotty panel, then again

onto an 11cm x 15cm pink blank, trimming the edges. Add red dashed lines to the edge of the cream circle and stick a strip of red spotty paper to the bottom of the blank. Stamp a 'Happy Christmas' sentiment on top, then tie white ribbon around the spine to finish.

5. Colour blending

Maker: COLETTE SMITH

Download the penguin motif from our website and print onto white card. Colour the body and eyelids grey, adding and blending dark grey where you want to create shadow. Make the beak and feet orange. Colour the scarf and earmuffs with pale aqua. Use a darker tone to add deep colour where creases or folds would form. Outline the images with pale blue or grey pen. Matt the character onto the bottom of a top-folding 10.5cm x 15cm blank. Cover the top of the greeting with blue card, then wrap black baker's twine around it several times and tie into a bow.



6. Stamp and colour

Maker: KATIE SKILTON

Have a hoot stamping this festive greeting. Using a 10cm x 14.5cm scallop-edged rectangle die, create a top-folding blank. Cut an identical shape from patterned paper and adhere onto the front of the card. Trim a rectangle from white cardstock, ink the edges, then layer onto the greeting. Add a patterned paper border to the base of the white rectangle. Stamp. colour and cut out an owl. Adhere to the left of the card with 3D foam pads. Stamp a sentiment onto blue card and trim, then stick top-right. Tuck washi tape under the sentiment. Add punched hearts, and embellish the greeting with silver gems.

7. Die-cut scenes

Maker: KITTY FRAMPTON

Build a sweet scene with stamped characters and festive die-cuts. Take a top-folding blank, 12.5cm x 14.5cm, and cover the front with red card. Trim blue background paper, 12cm x 14cm. Die cut two snowy hills and three tree trunks from white card, then fix to the base of the greeting. Wrap red baker's twine around the bottom of the card and tie into a bow. Die cut a snowflake banner from red card and fix to the top of the greeting. Add silver gems to the centre of each snowflake. Stamp two bears and a tree with black ink. Colour with markers, then cut out and adhere to the greeting with 3D foam pads. Stamp 'Merry everything' onto white card, trim into an oval banner, then fix to the card front.



Festive foiling

Accent your greetings with a luxury foiled touch using Gina K. Designs' range from Therm O Web

You will need

- Craft essentials (see p94)
- Foil: Fancy Foils Radiant Red, Sparkling Silver
- Foil-Mates: Holiday Cheer Sentiments, Blizzard & Ornamental Holiday Backgrounds
- Dies: Circle Nested Single Stitch, Double Stitch

Merry Christmas

Set your laminator to 5mil and leave for ten minutes to heat up. Meanwhile, take an 11cm x 14cm top-folding white blank. Cut the Foil-Mates Blizzard Snowflake panel to 9.5cm x 12.5cm. Cut black card to 10cm x 13cm.

2 Cut silver foil slightly larger than the snowflake panel and position the foil, colour side up, on top. Place the stack on a sheet of white card inside folded parchment paper, then insert into the laminator, creased edge first.

hat's Christmas without a bit of sparkle? Luckily for us crafters adding shimmer to your card designs has never been easier. Pair Therm O Web's Fancy Foils sheets with their Foil-Mates sentiments, backgrounds and images to create eye-catching, professional designs in a flash. Remove the snowflake panel from the parchment paper and peel away the foil to reveal a metallic finish.

Trim a Foil-Mates Ornamental Holiday striped panel to 2.5cm x 11cm, then foil with Radiant Red using the same method.

Adhere the snowflake background to black card. Wrap black gingham ribbon around the centre and tie into a bow, then secure the panel to the card front. Stick the red striped strip below the ribbon.

Die cut a 'Merry Christmas' sentiment using a double-stitched circle from the Holiday Cheer Foil-Mates sheet. Foil the sentiment with Radiant Red. Die cut a single-stitched circle from black card, then layer with the sentiment and glue to the card front.

Quilled baubles

Fill die-cut apertures with gorgeous quilled designs offering a metallic twist



OUR EXPERT ELIZABETH MOAD SHOWS YOU HOW!



You will need Mix of coils

- Craft essentials (see p94)
- Quilling papers, 3mm wide: pink, turquoises, white, metallic-edged pink
- Dies: baubles, alphabet
- Quilling tool
- > Needle tool
- > Punch, small hole

TOP TIP

Metallic strips are only coated on one edge, so take care to ensure the shiny side is uppermost

Die cut a large bauble from pink card. Fix to turquoise card using 3D foam pads. Take a 20cm length of 3mm wide light pink paper and create a loose, closed coil. Glue the end and pinch into a teardrop shape. Make 13 more in a mix of light and dark pink, then fix them within the bauble, tucking them between the two layers of card. Glue a strip of paper for a stem between the shapes.

Create four tight coils from 20cm lengths of turquoise paper and adhere along the stem. To make flowers, quill five tight coils, then a number of teardrop shapes from 15cm and 20cm lengths of turquoise and blue paper. Glue the teardrops around the tight coils.



Secure a pink open coil to each flower.

Wrap pink baker's twine around the top section of the panel and tie into a bow, then adhere this to a white side-opening blank. Add a small piece of turquoise card to mimic the top of the bauble. Die cut 'Noel' from burgundy card, fix to turquoise, then stick so it's protruding from the top of the greeting.

Thrifty gift tag

Use the leftover bauble die-cut from the Noel card to make a gift tag. Adopt the same techniques as before to craft flowers and leaves, this time with white, dark turquoise, pale pink and dark pink quilling papers. Adhere to the bauble, make a bauble top as before, then punch a small hole and thread with pink baker's twine to finish.

Double aperture

Die cut a large and medium bauble from burgundy card to create two apertures. Trim turquoise card to the same size. Die cut another medium bauble, this time from light turquoise card, and adhere to the turquoise panel so it'll show through the aperture. Stick the two panels together with 3D foam pads.

Take a 20cm length of 3mm wide pink paper and create a loose closed coil. Glue the end and pinch into a teardrop shape. Fix to the large bauble. Make five more and glue a strip of paper for a stem between the shapes. Tuck the coils between the two lavers of card.

Using a 20cm length of pink metallic-edged paper, make a tight coil. Glue the shape to the 'stem', then create two more and adhere. Make a tight coil with a 3cm length of pink, then six teardrop shapes with 15cm lengths of light turquoise paper. Glue around the tight coil and create two more flowers. Add three open coils using pink paper.

For the smaller bauble, use 20cm lengths of metallic-edged pink paper for the teardrop shapes. A tiny flower is made with 5cm lengths of pink for the petals. Using 10cm lengths of pink, create teardrop shapes and glue with open coils at the edges. Wrap baker's twine around each bauble and tie into a knot. Add small sections of turquoise card to the top of each bauble. Mount to a white blank and adhere a sentiment.






STEP-BY-STEP Quilled apertures



Die cut bauble apertures from burgundy card. Die cut another medium bauble from light turquoise, adhere to turquoise card, then fix the panel on top with 3D foam pads



Make three tight coils from metallic paper and glue to the 'stem'. Create a tight pink coil, then six teardrops from light turquoise paper. Glue around the tight coil. Make two more flowers and add three open coils



Create loose, closed coils from pink quilling paper, glue the ends and pinch into teardrop shapes. Fix to the large bauble and add a stem. Tuck the coils in



Quill similar motifs for the smaller bauble, creating a tiny flower with 5cm lengths of pink for the petals. Using 10cm lengths of pink, make teardrop shapes and glue with open coils at the edges



ELIZABETH'S TOP TIPS

Classic motif

Christmas is a time of trees laden with baubles, so why not use this traditional decoration for your festive cards and tags too? Two layers of card are separated with 3D foam pads to create a space between the panels. The quilling sits in the aperture neatly, but can also tuck under the top layer. This creates depth and allows the patterns to look like they're actually part of it.

Festive twist

Don't feel like you have to fill the shapes with Christmas motifs. I've quilled floral patterns for these cards, because the striking apertures and wintry colour palette ensure a festive finish all on their own. If you're an experienced quiller, however, why not try holly shapes or even coiled lettering? Either way, definitely opt for metallic-edged strips. They give off shine and a bit of luxury, resulting in classy cards that are sure to wow your friends.

Festive fine dining

Add the finishing touches to the Christmas table with Keren Baker's vibrant makes



h the Christmas dining table. It's an aspect of the big day that can easily be overlooked amongst all the rush, but we're here to help with a trio of easy makes that will set your spread apart from the rest. Using intricate wreath dies and bright patterned paper, Keren Baker has whipped up a brilliant collection that will add a handmade touch to the highly-anticipated Christmas feast.

Table centre box

Die cut a triangular box from white card. Make two panels from teal and one from patterned paper. Die cut two triangles for the top and bottom of the box. Adhere all the papers as shown.

Make two sprigs in teal and add to the centre of the box. Die-cut 'J' and 'Y' from red paper and a star from yellow. Secure to the patterned panel of the box. Create scalloped edges from teal and adhere to the side lids. Add Nuvo Drops onto the leaves to finish.

Cutlery wrap

Die cut lots of sprigs from teal card and adhere three together to make a circle. Die cut berry branches in red and green and secure together.

2 Stick the berry branches around the wreath, then add more teal sprigs on top to create a full wreath. Secure a baker's twine bow to the top, then wrap red ribbon around a serviette or cutlery and fix the wreath to the top.



Place cards

Take white card, 7.5cm x 9cm, then score and fold in half. Add patterned paper, slightly smaller than the card. Fix a strip of yellow along the bottom and a small panel of white for the name. Die cut a wreath from teal and fix to the place card. Write the name and repeat for as many guests as you need.

HOW DO YOU FEEL ABOUT BEING CHOSEN AS PAPERCRAFTER'S DESIGNER FOR THE DAY?

I am really very honoured to have been chosen as Designer for the Day. To have my work valued in this way is so encouraging. I love being able to share my projects and ideas with others and this gives me the perfect outlet to do this.

WHAT ARE YOUR FAVOURITE MATERIALS TO WORK WITH?

I love using patterned paper, ephemera and paper or cloth flowers. These materials are great for layering and building up a project to give it dimension and life.

Starry nights

Use Lia Griffith's digital cutting files to craft shining decorations this Christmas

hese retro-inspired paper stars add a luxe look to holiday décor and are suitable for leaving up long after the New Year's Eve party to brighten the dark nights of winter. Frosted gold paper adds a bit of sparkle and the same shape in a flat cut makes a gorgeous garland too. Enhance canapés or drinks with mini paper stars or sprinkle them onto your buffet table like confetti. Here's how to do it!

You will need

- Template from paper craftermagazine.co.uk
- Paper, frosted text-weight, gold
- Glue gun

3D stars

1 Cut out and score our template shapes from papercrafter magazine.co.uk using frosted text-weight paper. To create the arms of the star, fold along all of the score lines. Fold them in towards the centre of the paper to form 3D shapes.

Overlap the large back tabs and glue them into place. Repeat this process with the smaller, angled tabs. Fold the large star piece along all of the score lines. Turn it over and overlap the flaps, glueing them into place. There will now be four arms on your large centre piece.

Add hot glue to the smaller angled tabs on the individual star arms and position them into place between the arms on the large centre piece. Position and glue the final piece onto the back of the star.

Why not try...?

Your template pack also comes with shapes to make two other types of stars. To create a garland, tie gold embroidery thread to each star and attach them to a long thread to install on your mantelpiece or elsewhere. To make drink décor, glue a confetti star to a wooden skewer and pop it into your glass.



YOU SUGGEST EOR STAMPING CRISP IMAGES? TRACEY DUTTON **SAYS:** My preference

would be to always use

WHAT INK DO

Versafine ink to stamp with - it's an oil-based ink that is designed for detailed stamps, depicting amazing detail. It's also great for silhouette stamps, giving you a true solid colour every time. Versafine has an array of coloured ink pads to choose from too. By using different coloured inks to stamp with, you can create foreground and backgrounds very easily. These give your projects wonderful depth so it's worth experimenting.

TOP TIP

Try using rectangle dies to create bricks for your fireplace, then distress them with brown ink pads







HOW CAN I MAKE THE MOST OF MY DIES?

TRACEY DAYKIN-JONES SAYS: You don't need to go out and

purchase new dies for every greeting you create. Get creative and see the versatility in your stash of dies. To make my festive fireplace scene I used the heel of a Christmas stocking to die cut flames. I also used a large window die to create the fireplace. To make this warming greeting, start by taking a 10cm x14.5cm top-folding blank and cover it with green tartan paper. Adhere red and diamond paper to thin card, 9cm x 13.5cm. Die cut a triangle from the top-centre of this, then adhere to the card front with 3D foam pads. Die cut a fireplace, adhere to black card, then stick to the greeting. Die cut five flames from yellow card and fix in the fireplace. Die cut three stockings, thread onto white cord, then secure at the top of the fireplace. Die cut two stitched triangles from green card and fix in place. Decorate the trees with yellow glitter stars and gold gems.

CAN YOU SHOW ME HOW TO **GREETING?**

COLETTE SMITH SAYS: I love making kinetic cards and they're even more fun to receive. The best motion greetings carry a strong theme and bring to life certain elements of the design. I decided to take it up a level this Christmas and create a greeting that doubles up as a game. My Santa spinner card would make a great table party game as well as a greeting - make one for each of your friends, or you can even create a larger version. You can have fun changing the words on each section to suit the recipient. All you need is some coloured card, my Santa templates, letter dies and a brad.

Colette Smith enjoys creating original projects for you to craft.

> TOP TIP Don't close the brad too tightly or the Santa will not spin freely







Download the Santa templates from **papercrafter** magazine.co.uk and cut the brim, moustache and beard from white card and a hat from red. Punch a 5cm circle from peach card, a 1cm circle of white card and two small circles from black and pink card

Assemble Santa and matt onto gold card, then punch a hole just above the moustache. Cut two 14cm circles from green and red card. Divide each circle into six segments

Stick the segments onto a 14cm circle of card, alternating the colours. Punch a hole in the centre. Punch two 2.5cm circles from white card, glue together, then punch a hole in the middle. Glue this to the centre of the larger circle, lining up the holes

Push a pink brad through the Santa and circle. Die cut 'Naughty' and 'Nice' from gold card and stick them to the segments. Matt the circle onto a 15cm square white blank and decorate the corners with gold stars

ALWAYS END UP MISPLACING MY STAMPS - IS THERE A GOOD WAY OF STORING THEM?

No one particular way is better than another - it's about finding what's right

for you and the space you have to hand! Many crafters devise their own filing system for easy reference by using clear plastic wallets or folders for housing their stamps, which is great for seeing exactly what you have at a glance. Acrylic stamps stick straight to acetate. while grey unmounted stamps can be

pre-cut and sprayed with repositionable adhesive and stuck to an acrylic panel. Organise them in a way that you'll know works for you, whether that's alphabetically, by brand or by type of stamp such as character, sentiment or background.

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

Paper fold a festive fir

SEASON'S GREETINGS





- ★ Read all about the history of advent calendars

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QUICK JARGON BUSTER

- > BRADS: paper fasteners with split pins that pierce paper then pull apart to secure on the reverse
- > **DECOUPAGE:** strips of paper are pasted to cover an object, or creating a 3D image by layering paper, where the smaller parts of a repeated image are cut out and added to the original image for a raised effect
- > **DIE-CUTTING:** a die-cutting machine cuts out shapes from paper, card and other materials. Sandwich a metal die over your material then feed it through the machine. The pressure on the die creates the cut
- > MATTING: the method of layering different sizes of paper or card pieces together
- > ORIGAMI: the traditional Japanese art of folding paper to create 3D shapes
- > **SANDING:** using a sanding block to create a rough texture on the face or edges of a piece of card
- > SCORING: the method of running a scoring tool over a piece of card to create a straight line that can then be folded

Step-by-step Novelty card



Die cut an 11.5cm diameter circle, allowing the die to overlap the fold so the layers remain joined. Glue a brown circle to the front, then trim a small section from the base to allow the card to stand



Use a hole punch to create orange, red, gold and dark brown circles, then stick them to the lower half. Die cut holly leaves and berries



Create a third circle from white card and draw a deep wavy line across the middle, then trim and stick to the top



Doodle details using a black fineliner and white gel pen. Stick the holly and fruit to the top of the blank, adding a white pearl to each berry

Layered greeting

Create a 14.5cm square tent-fold card, then matt green gingham paper measuring slightly smaller on top. Layer a 12.5cm square piece of snowflake patterned paper onto red dotted paper, leaving a narrow border.

Matt 4.5cm x 12.5cm of tree paper onto red dotted paper and

attach a strip of green gingham paper across it. Trim the excess and glue towards the bottom of the card.

Add 3D foam pads to the back of a Christmas sentiment and glue onto the green panel. Attach a 'Merry' sticker to the top-right of the card with 3D foam pads.

Arrange presents and a tree motif onto the greeting and secure. Fix a Santa die-cut with 3D foam pads. Add five striped candy dots to the bottom.

HOW DO YOU DESIGN YOUR PATTERNS?

I create all my patterns and motifs by hand, always have since I started over 25 years ago and probably always will. I really enjoy feeling the materials in my hands. I never took to using computers really, and it doesn't satisfy me creatively to design on the computer. My process varies - I like to cut designs out of paper sometimes, other days they are ink drawings with a brush, a simple drawing by pen or a block print. There are some periods where I'm constantly making, and then I can go a long time when I don't create designs at all... it ebbs and flows, depending on my mood and feeling.

WHAT IS IT THAT YOU ENJOY ABOUT PATTERNS?

It creates a sense of order; a repeat that is both comforting for the eye and the mind. Patterns can also change and add so much in one's environment and life – a very bold decorative curtain can completely change the mood in a room. And a patterned envelope that arrives in the post can feel like a real treasure that stands out among junk mail and bills.

WHEN DID YOUR LOVE OF PAPER BEGIN?

I don't know, I've probably always had a love of paper... since I was very little. As a kid I loved the wrap around Christmas presents, collected paper bookmarks, had many pen pals and avidly decorated my stationery. I collected candy wrappers because I loved the patterns and colours, made paper dolls and gathered printed paper napkins from restaurants all over the world. My love for paper goes on and on!

DO YOU HAVE ANY MORE CHILDHOOD CRAFTING MEMORIES?

Oh yes! I drew a great deal, especially for my grandmother who really was my biggest supporter. I spent time making things out in nature with sticks and flowers. I also enjoyed working in clay, making figurines and clay wall hangings with carved patterns and motifs. I stencilled and decorated my wardrobe doors and chairs with floral motifs too.

WE LOVE YOUR NEW BOOK PAPER, PATTERN, PLAY – WHAT DO YOU WANT READERS TO TAKE FROM IT?

Thank you! I hope that people will really use this book: cut into it, rip out papers,

fold and make. Not only is the process so fun and satisfying, it's also a great activity to do alone or together with a few friends. I hope that these papers will come out of the book and not stay within the cover, tucked into a bookshelf somewhere. They should be used, or sent and shared with others.

WHAT IS YOUR FAVOURITE TECHNIQUE TO USE WHEN CREATING SOMETHING FROM PAPER?

It varies from time to time. Right now I really enjoy block printing and want to spend more time doing that, but for a long time I have been creating patterns by cutting out shapes and forms from paper.
