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


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Ways with washi tape


Washi tape is a high-quality masking tape made from natural fibres such as bamboo, hemp, rice, wheat or from the bark of native Japanese trees. But more than that, washi tape is a material which is beautiful yet useful at the same time. You can tear it, stick it, reposition it and write on it. The low-tack adhesive makes it extremely easy to use and re-use. I think it's so popular because of its versatility – and it looks great too!

The scrapbooking world has been impacted by washi tape for a few years now and, lucky for us, the colours and designs that are now available are endless. And that goes for ideas on how to use it as well! There are no limits on how you can use this fabulous product, it just takes a bit of imagination and creativity and you can come up with something really special. Whether you're using it to create a background, cover embellishments, or using just a few random pieces placed on your page, it always looks great – best of all, it will look unique too! One of the great things about washi tape is that it is not overly sticky, therefore it is very easy to pull up and move if needed, or even re-use elsewhere on another project.

HERE ARE JUST A FEW WAYS YOU CAN USE WASHI TAPE ON YOUR PAGES:


Backgrounds – You can use as much or as little washi tape as you like for your background, depending on the look you are trying to achieve. Simply find a starting point then lay different lengths of a variety of tapes down on your page. Plain cardstock will probably give the best effect. Overlap pieces at different intervals to give a more random look and try adding small pieces of a black tape randomly over your finished background to add more interest. Stamping over your washi strips is another way of adding more depth to your background. Just make sure you use a permanent ink such as Stazon, otherwise your stamping will smudge quite easily due to the sheen finish of washi tape. Creating chevrons with washi tape is another great idea for a background.

Covering embellishments – The opportunities are endless with this one. You can cover anything and everything: chipboard pieces, buttons, metal clips, mini clothes pegs, tags, letters or anything else your imagination can come up with.

Punched/die-cut embellishments – Cover a piece of cardstock or scrap paper with either one or a variety of washi tape strips, then simply punch/ die-cut your desired shape for something unique.

Creating a hinged tab – This is a great way of adding more space on your page for journalling, extra photos or perhaps some ephemera. Simply add a strip of washi tape along an entire edge of a piece of cardstock, patterned paper or photo, and adhere it so that it is the anchor point and is able to be lifted/turned to reveal your journalling or little hidden bits.

Journalling – Strips of washi tape are great for journalling on – but make sure you use a journalling pen with permanent ink so that your journalling doesn't smudge.






Cut two pieces of washi tape to the length you would like for your feather, then cut one piece of string so that it is slightly longer. The string will form the quill of the feather.










Turn it over, and press the second washi strip to the opposite side so that both sticky sides are adhered to each other, taking care to line the edges up evenly.

Recently, one Australian Project Life community on Facebook supported a Western Australian hospital unit by gathering Project Life items for children and their families who wish to document their journey while facing their medical issues. The response was an overwhelming success and organisers were flooded with donations of a vast array of Project Life and other scrapbooking items. Generally, the scrapbooking community has also been an avid supporter of the National Breast Cancer Foundation by holding crop nights and fundraising events for many years. Retreats are a wonderful place to gather together while scrapbooking for a cause. At a recent retreat I attended in the Tamworth area, the attendees raised an incredible \$2000 to support Kar-24 in the Kidney Kar Rally. The amazing Camp Mojo retreats, hosted by Sherry Mendoza, collect art from creative spirits who wish to donate to an auction, and proceeds are forwarded to various charities, including the Make A Wish Foundation and the Blue Mountains Bushfire Fund. Peta Macbeth and the wonderful women from the Scrapbooking From Scratch (SFS) team host creative retreats where funds raised from activities and challenges are donated to the NSW Hunter Region SIDS and Kids Organisation.

This organisation is 100 per cent reliant on donations to help bereaved families deal with the loss of a child through support and counselling. This same scrapbooking community, SFS, during a June 2014 retreat, put together an incredible Project Life scrapbooking starter pack for a local woman unable to attend the retreat due to the recent loss of her husband, now having to care for her children on her own. The scrapbooking community as a whole are an incredibly generous bunch of creative spirits.

So how can you be involved in charity-driven scrapbooking?

A great way to start is to attend an event so you can see what happens and where your role could possibly be. Have you ever thought about hosting a scrapbooking event? You could start small, by hosting a crop day. Ask your local scrapbooking shop if they would be interested in hosting a charity day, or check out your local community halls and club facilities. 

Black backgrounds

We don't see many black backgrounds in scrapbooking, but I think we should! Let me explain why and give you some pointers on the most effective ways to use them.

Black backgrounds can really make a page pop. Like white backgrounds, black ones provide a strong contrast for your foreground work – photos, papers and embellishments. The greater the contrast, the more eye-catching your work will be.

So why do we use so many more white backgrounds than black ones? White backgrounds show up everything well – all sprays, paints, papers and embellishments contrast against them beautifully. Black, however, can be more challenging as not all products can be seen clearly against it. If you spray a dark blue spray onto a black background you won't even see it.

Therefore you have to be more selective about which products you use. Stick to lighter, stronger colours or metallics and check that each product shows clearly against the black before committing it to your page.





Beautiful moments

Materials: Paper – 13arts; Stamps – Kaisercraft, Pink Paislee, StazOn, Brilliance and VersaMark ink; Embellishments – Sandylion, Fancy Pants Designs and BasicGrey rub-ons, Kaisercraft negatives and ribbon roses, Manor House Creations feathers and flowers, Dusty Attic chipboard, 13arts stickers, Dymo labeller, ribbon, pens, Tinby Designs Metallic Melts, Faber-Castell Gelatos, Ranger Liquid Pearls, Jo Sonja's metallic paint.

Workshop Secrets

Some products that I've found to be good to use are:


Sprays: Most of the shimmer types of sprays work well. They tend to lose some of their colour strength but the glimmer remains strong. Tsukineko Fireworks, Heidi Swapp Color Shine and Lindy's Stamp Gang sprays are great, although some colours work better than others, so test each one first. Avoid non-shimmery sprays as they tend to disappear into the darkness. A good white spray can work well though.


Tinby Designs Metallic Melts: These little pots of glimmering loveliness bring serious wow factor to any page and a black background really makes them pop. Try them on chipboard or apply them directly onto the background.

Metallic paints: Products such as Jo Sonja's Metallic Colours and Viva Décor's Inka Gold can look amazing when backed with black. They can coat many different products too, giving you greater flexibility.

Liquid Pearls: Even the softer colours of these look amazing against black. Try adding drops of them in place of paint flicks, as I did in my 'Beautiful moments' layout. You can also coat chipboard pieces or write with them.

White rub-ons: These look stunning! If you plan to use black backgrounds and you don't have any of these, do yourself a favour and go buy some. Don't underestimate the power of white when working with large areas of black. Placing white between other colours and black can create very strong focal points. Stamping with white ink creates a gorgeous, soft background when used on black cardstock. For a stronger look, stamp with white paint. White features in both my layouts here.





Rockabilly chick

Materials: Paper – BasicGrey, October Afternoon, Graphic 45, Carta Bella, scraps; Stamp – Kaisercraft; Embellishments – Dusty Attic chipboard and Dusty In Color paint, American Crafts Thickers, gel pen.

You need to use some judgement when choosing which photos to scrap onto a black background. Ask yourself if black is in keeping with the feeling of the photo. Photos taken at night or indoors would work well. Photos of fireworks, city lights, camping and night-time celebrations all work perfectly. Look for black clothing like skater gear, gothic or even rockabilly fashion, and photos of events where people are formally dressed. As a general rule, don't choose photos of sunny, outdoor scenes, a day at the beach or a child's party. The black would just look wrong against these colourful scenes.

As I've said, black provides a strong contrast, but that doesn't mean you have to use strong colours with it. I used soft pinks, white-stamped images, white rub-ons and feathers to create the soft, dreamy feel in my 'Beautiful moments' layout. On the other hand, 'Rockabilly chick' shows how bold colours get that extra oomph when contrasted against black.

Black backgrounds add a sense of mystery to some layouts and a sense of strength to others, but they definitely add some excitement to all layouts! I hope you can give them a try.

Love Your Sister: One year on

Twelve months ago I covered the heart-warming story of Love Your Sister and all the amazing feats Connie and Samuel Johnson had been up to on their quest to raise awareness and money for breast cancer research. A year later, Connie and Sam have reached their goals and now are planning so much more for their little charity that could.

A lot can happen in twelve months for anyone, but when you are as aware of time as a terminal breast cancer patient and as determined as the Johnson siblings are, what you can get done in twelve months is phenomenal. One year ago, Sam was two-thirds of the way through his 15 000 km unicycle ride around Australia and Love Your Sister was close to reaching their fundraising aim of \$1 million. Not long after, that figure was smashed, and at the time of writing the tally sits at \$1.84 million.

Connie's health has remained better than expected in the last twelve months, with the cancer remaining stable. It does not mean she is in remission but it gives her more time to devote to her family and Love Your Sister. It has been four years since she was told she had six months to live, and this allows her to feel a bit more confident about the future. "I'm cherishing the time that I do have," she explains. "I kept hoping for a miracle and I kind of got it."

Connie has loved every minute of Love Your Sister, describing the experience as "Jaw-droppingly amazing, incredible and life-affirming." The Love Your Sister ride around Australia was full of events, dares, receptions and meetings, and while it would be hard to pick highlights of the twelve-month odyssey, Sam is quick to point out all of the people he met along the way. "I was welcomed into so many communities, and I got to see how generous and caring people are, and how much people want to help each other. To see this in thousands of people across the country was an honour and a privilege."

This generosity of ordinary Australians helped Love Your Sister raise an extra \$500 000 by the journey's end. And what an end it was, with Sam riding into Federation Square in Melbourne to meet Connie and thousands of Love Your Sister supporters. It was a momentous occasion full of emotion for both siblings. When times got tough on the road, Sam would visualise riding over the finish line with Connie waiting for him. "I'm just so glad that she was there, that she made it." And for Connie the end was a testament to Sam's character. "I was so proud of him. I'm proud of us for what we did and the fact that we did everything that we set out to do."



Their accomplishments are ones that will have a resonating effect on the lives of many people. It is in fact quite staggering when you take a look at what Love Your Sister has done. The money raised has been donated to the Garvan Research Foundation, all of which goes to the Connie Johnson Fellowship in Breast Cancer research. The search for a deserving recipient of these funds is currently underway. The Garvan Research Foundation's specific aims for the fellowship are to investigate the genetic and environmental causes of breast cancer; develop genetic markers that can be used for early detection, as indicators of likely disease progression, and how the disease will respond to treatment; and to study the genetics and biochemistry of tumour growth. The ramifications of this research could change the way we deal with breast cancer completely.

Connie and Sam's other main aim was to make women all around the country 'breast aware', and while Connie initially thought they would never know if they had achieved this goal, it became clear early on that their message was being received by many women. In the last 18 months, they have heard of many ladies who, after encountering Love Your Sister in one way or another, checked their breasts and found a lump. In all these cases, the cancer has been detected early, allowing for good treatment options. The gravity of their effect on these women's lives has not been lost on Connie or Sam. "We don't want to



scare people into thinking that everyone will get this awful disease, we are simply urging women to be proactive if they notice changes in their breasts, and to be aware of the difference that early detection makes when fighting a battle against cancer," Sam says.

So now that the ride is over and one million dollars has been raised, that's the end of Love Your Sister, right? Wrong! The momentum of Love Your Sister seems to be gaining speed and Connie and Sam have upped their fundraising goal from \$1 million to \$10 million! Right after the ride was finished, a team of volunteer filmmakers put together a TV special on Love Your Sister from footage taken over the course of the ride. The documentary was made on a budget of \$0 and was aired nationally on

Channel 10. That one-hour special alone generated another \$150 000 in merchandise sales and donations.

In June and July, Sam and Connie got down to putting their story on paper and Love Your Sister the book will be published next month through Hachette. A portion of the profit for each copy sold will be donated to the Garvan Research Foundation. There are a few more big projects in the works to get Love Your Sister ever closer to that \$10 million, and this month promises to be a big one for Sam and Connie. No matter what it takes, both are eager to make a serious impact on the future of this disease.

Ever the conscientious pair, Sam and Connie wanted to thank SBM readers for their continued support. Sam also wanted to specifically thank the Masters for creating the beautiful journals (see pp. 63-68) that have been donated to women with terminal breast cancer. "I know that the first thing on Connie's bucket list was to leave a nice record of her time with her children. As a scrapbooker, she obviously chose to scrapbook their memories,





but many women are not that way inclined or do not have the time or energy left to do elaborate scrapbooking, so these journals are a perfect way for them to preserve some of their most treasured moments for their families."

No matter what the future holds for Love Your Sister, Connie is adamant about continuing her aim of making more women breast aware. "Early detection makes the difference between surviving this disease and dying from it. It happens to one in 10 women. 15 000 women every

year get diagnosed in Australia alone. Seven women a day die from it. You don't need a family history of it and you don't have to be over 50 to get it, so just be aware of changes in your body." Her purpose is clear and has been from the beginning. "I told Sam when I first dared him to do this 'I'd just like to save one other family from having to go through this'". It's safe to say that she has achieved that for many families and will continue to do so. We've all known it for a long time, but Connie is an amazing woman.

Throughout this entire journey, one thing has remained constant. The relationship between brother and sister is still just as touching as it was twelve months ago. Sam sums up their experience best. "I am so glad Connie pushed me to do this. She has given me the gift of a lifetime, and the experience has changed my perspective on life, family, love and human nature."

And at the end of the day, what more can you ask for from your family?



Materials: X-Press It Blending Journal; Punch – EK Success; Embellishments – X-Press It stencil sheets and wide glue marker, Spellbinders dies, The Crafter's Workshop stencil, Copic markers.

IDEAS:

- Create a custom stencil by die-cutting a Spellbinders expandable pattern out of the X-Press It adhesive stencil sheets. These allow for better stencilling as the air pushed out by the Copic Airbrush system does not lift it from the paper.
- The blending paper contained in this journal allows you to explore your Copic markers in so many ways. As markers, they glide on beautifully and for the airbrush system the paper creates a perfectly smooth surface for a faultless finish.
- Hold plastic stencils down with your fingers as you go. To create depth, as shown in the 'love it' arrow, apply the airbrushing as an outline and leave the centre lighter.
- Not all journal pages need a mixed-media look. Using just one medium can be just as effective.

IDEAS:

- A glue pen allows you to affix those smaller and more delicate paper accents.
- Black rub-ons on a bold background give a crisper and more striking contrast than a stamped image.
- Use Archival ink to stamp on mixed-media projects as the images won't run when using mists or any other wet medium.

GO BIG WITH PHOTO BACKGROUNDS

Do you have a photo for which you can't find the right background paper to complement it? Perhaps you have a special photo and want to make it the focus? Why not go BIG and blow up your photo to become your background paper. It is such a simple and fast way to make a statement layout.

You don't need a professional camera to take a photo that can be enlarged to 12in x 12in when printed. Most mobile phones have the ability to take photos that are good enough to enlarge to a full 12in x 12in page. The photo that I am using for the background was taken in 2005, with a digital camera that would probably not compare to the quality of most mobile phone cameras today.

In Photoshop Elements create a 12in x 12in blank document, 300dpi (resolution) and select

white for the background contents. Drag the photo you would like as a background into your 12in x 12in document.





Select your photo and press CRT+T (this is a shortcut for resizing whatever you have selected) make sure the Constrain Proportions box is ticked; this prevents warping the image. Select one of the corners of your photo and drag it out until your

image covers the entire 12in x 12in document. Move and position your image to where you are happy with it.

You now have a really big square picture; the next step is to adjust the opacity level of this layer. You will find it in the layers palette. Slide the circle to the percentage you prefer, I chose 50 per cent. This will vary depending on the photo you



are using. You can decide on a higher or lower percentage of opacity, according to your personal preference.

To keep the large photo as the focal point, and to not overcrowd my page, I then added a small cluster of elements down the bottom of the page with only a small heading and a little journalling.

You can play around with this technique and create some really interesting and unique background papers to use on your layouts. Why not take landscape photos, close-ups of nature (bark, leaves flowers) or even fabric, then follow the earlier steps to create your own designer papers? If you are feeling more adventurous, try playing around with the colour by going to Enhance Menu > Adjust Colour > Adjust Hue/Saturation, for some really fun results.

You may want to focus on a technique or embellishment as well as your journalling.

If you're a younger scrapper like me you've probably taken the occasional selfie. I often create layouts with these photos but don't necessarily want to journal about them. Sometimes I don't even have a title, I just want to focus my layout on the design and products and don't want to document anything through words.

- Use a stencil and the Permaball pens to add a pattern to your front page. Use the Frixion markers to colour the outline in. Use your stamps to add special messages and encouraging words.
- Use an ink pad to shade the edges and embellish the cover however you like. Use the markers to help with your colour selections.

- Cover scrap paper with Sellotape continuous label tape and die-cut shapes – the more layers of tape and washi, the thicker and more textural your shapes will be!
- Pilot Frixion colour pens are ideal for colouring any hand-drawn images as they don't pick up any black pen on the coloured tips – even within seconds of completing a drawing!

 Cut patterned paper to size and punch down the length at points corresponding to the binding. Once punched, snip the section between the edge and the punched hole and press over the binding comb.
- If you have an electronic cutting machine, like a Silhouette Cameo, you can design and cut your own custom page dividers.
 Give blank pages life without bulk, by adding some stamping, ink splatters or stencil work.





- Once all the modelling paste is dry and you've attached your flowers to the front of the journal, go back with some watercolour and add hints of colour to help unify the background.
